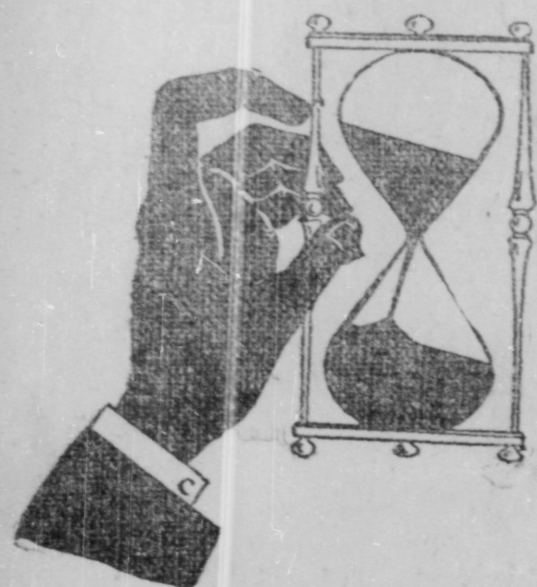

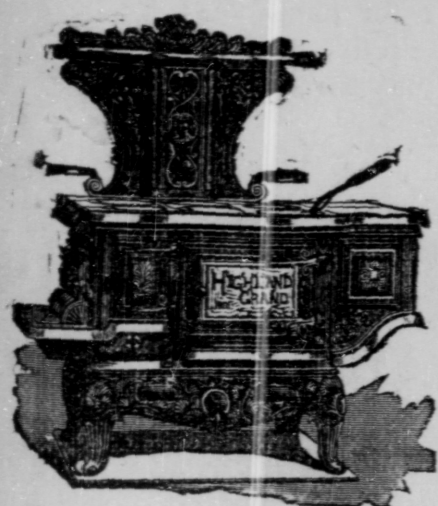

W. S. STEWART, Q. C. P. A., OPPOSITION CANDIDATE FOR WEST QUEEN'S

Mr. Stewart, who was the son of the late Mr. Alexander Stewart, a well known farmer of Marshfield, Lot 34 was born at the latter place in 1855. He was educated at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and at McGill University, Montreal. He particularly distinguished himself during his College career graduating at the head of his year at McGill and winning the Chapman Gold Medal for first class honors in classics. He studied law in the office of the Hon. Fred Peters formerly Attorney-General and Premier of this Province, and now law partner with Sir Charles H. Tupper in British Columbia. On being admitted to the Bar Mr. Stewart became a partner with Mr. Peters and very soon became a leading member of the legal profession.

Without disparagement of others it will be freely conceded that Mr. Stewart occupies a place in the very front rank of the Bar of Prince Edward Island. He is distinguished for keen legal acumen great persuasiveness as a pleader and for straightforward conduct in his profession.

He is a well informed and graceful public speaker. His extensive law practice has brought him into close relationship with the people of West Queen's who look upon his career with a pardonable degree of pride. Since his nomination by the Liberal-Conservative convention he has developed a strength as a candidate which is a surprise to all. The most cheering accounts as to the prospects of Mr. Stewart's election are being daily received from all parts of the West Queens riding, and the friends of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries are compelled to admit that Mr. Stewart is making alarming inroads in their rank. The tide has set in strongly in favor of the brilliant Conservative candidate and it is confidently believed that he will be the representative of West Queen's after the 7th of November. Nobody will deny that in point of ability Mr. Stewart is at least the equal of his opponent Sir Louis Davies, while he has an admitted reputation for keeping his word a quality in which the Minister of Marine and Fisheries is sadly lacking.
