Wholesalers to retail stores, one and two pound prints, 66c.

In Charlottetown the price of butter must be kept in line with that of the other two Maritime Provinces, and the wholesale price in this Province now is the wholesale price of either New Brunswick or Nova Scotia delivered, or minus the freight to the shipping station of the purchaser, or minus the truckage, as the case may be. The wholesale price, therefore, is in the vicinity of 63c, with local jobbing at 65c.

On the Montreal market current receipts wholesale are: 61 1/2c for No. 1 solids. Out-of-storage butter is selling for 62 1/4c to 62 1/2c for No. 1 solids.

For weeks at a time, he added, traffic has never been cleared at either terminal at any sailing and have often had a lineup of cars in the early forenoon that would fill each boat for the full day. This meant frequently that tourists who planned to be somewhere at a certain time had to sit on the pier until 3 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon "or worse still cannot get space until the following day."

He mentioned the requirement, due to shortage of space, of handling perishable products and livestock on a priority basis. This Mr. Mutch said, led to complaints from tourists who have stayed "on the pier for hours and who when his turn comes is obliged to push back to permit a load of live hogs to take his place."

Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, Dec. 4 (CP) - A Korean casualty list today included two men killed in action and five men wounded in action. The last list was issued Nov. 25.

All were members of the 3rd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, which went into the lines on Nov. 19.

The army list brought to 1,245 total casualties so far suffered by Canadian troops in Korea, including 233 dead, 899 wounded, 28 missing, 84 injured in action and one captured.

In addition the navy has reported three dead and three injured in action.

Edmonton, Dec. 4 (CP) - Dr. J. B. Stirling of Montreal, president of the Engineering Institute of Canada, said today reports of a tremendous drain of Canadian engineers to the United States "really was a myth."

Dr. Stirling, making a tour of Western EIC branches, said the Immigration Department reported that at no time had a movement of engineers to the U. S. exceeded more than one per cent of the graduating classes in a year.

He said 8,140 students were enrolled in engineering courses at Canadian universities this year, an increase of 8.5 per cent over 1951. The estimated number of graduates this year was 1,356.
