LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

B. I. S.—Regular monthly meeting tomorrow at 3 o'clock, p. m. A full attendance is requested.

HEARTZ'S HALL.—Prof W. W. Andrews, of Sackville University, will preach at Hertz's Hall tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

FIRE AT TRURO.—Fire was discovered in Learmont's hotel, Truro, a few nights ago, but not before damage to the extent of \$1,000 or \$1,500 was done. The fire was discovered before the occupants of the hotel had retired, otherwise the handsome hotel might have been totally destroyed. Andy Learmont, the proprietor, was badly burned about the hands. Ike Friedman, commercial traveller, saved his samples with great difficulty.

THE CHARLOTTETOWN RACES.—The recent Exhibition races at Charlottetown have been the most remarkable ever held in the provinces. No such time has ever been made at the provincial meeting. The Maritime track record has been lowered by both Minota and Warren Guy to 2:19 1/2—both beating 2:20 for the first time in a race in the provinces, and Minota has the honor of being the first Province bred to enter in the twenty list on a Maritime Province track.—Halifax Recorder.

THE TURF.—In the 2.28 trot at Halifax on Thursday Pannock won, with Minnie second and Minnie N. third. It took six heats to decide this race. The best time was 2.32 1/2. In the 2.25 class Katrina won in 5 heats, Warren Guy second, Resolution third. Best time 2.30 1/2.

Star Pointer paced a mile in 2:04 in a trial against his own record of 1.59 1/2, on the Terre Haute track a few days ago. After Star Pointer, Joe Patchen started in to lower his record of 2:01 1/2, and paced the mile in 2:04 1/2.

THIEVES ABROAD.—The Guardian is informed that a gang of thieves are operating in Freetown and that quite a number of petty robberies have been committed. Mr. Jesse A. Wright, of North Bedeque, while driving through from Freetown station a few nights ago had a parcel stolen out of his carriage by an unknown man who stole a ride by jumping on the back of his carriage. A young lady while driving through the Back Road from Ross' Corner to Freetown was chased by a tramp but by a vigorous use of the whip—applied unfortunately to the horse instead of the tramp—escaped with only a slight scare.

A STRANGE INCIDENT.—Two comrades named Rogers and Newcombe came over from Newfoundland this spring, and began work in Albert county. A few weeks ago the former had his head sawed off in a mill, and his wages were utilized in sending the body home for burial. The other said if anything should happen him that he wanted them to bury his body wherever he was at work, and send the money home, as it would do more good. Last Thursday, at Riversdale, Albert county, he was kicked in the pit of the stomach by a horse from a tread mill and sank down dead. On Sunday his remains were interred in the cemetery of the village where the fatal accident occurred. This seems a rather strange incident.—Moncton Times.

A SENSATION IN COURT.

Tilt Between the Counsel and the Accused in the Tarte-Grenier Case.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30.—The cross-examination of the accused Grenier by Mr. St. Pierre occupied most of the afternoon. He was questioned at length in regard to \$500 which he received from Mr. Mercier to publish pictures of leading liberals in his paper, La Vie Illustrée. Mr. Beausoleil, he admitted, had accused him of appropriating this, but he denied it and told what debts he had paid. A sensational incident took place when the accused said Mr. St. Pierre had offered to defend him, to which Mr. St. Pierre responded that witness was a liar. Witness called upon God to strike him dead if it were not true. "You are a blasphemer," said Mr. Pierre. The judge advised the witness to withdraw his statement as he was only injuring his case. Grenier declared that he would not; that the truth had to come out. The incident passed over and the examination was continued, but little that was new was elicited.

Labouef, for the defence, protested against an article last night published in La Patrie, reflecting on the case. Counsel for the prosecution cited that like comments had appeared in La Presse and La Minerve. In consequence of this Judge Wurtle declared that hereafter at night the jury would have to be locked up. W. A. Grenier the defendant then took the stand. He detailed that when the grip paper Le Soir stopped publication after the last federal election \$700 was due him from it. He went to Hon. C. A. Geoffrion about the claim, who referred him to Mr. Tarte. He has gone to Ottawa and Mr. Tarte said the claim would be arranged.

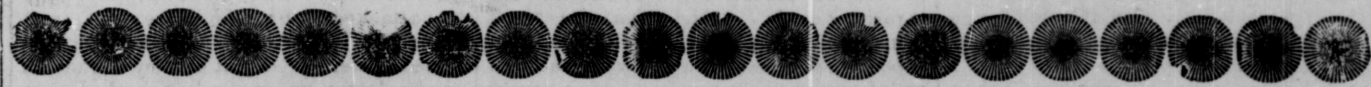
