Mother Of Nine Qualifies For A Life Saving Medal

An Island mother of nine daughters ranging from infancy to age ten, believed that the best way to protect her children from water hazards and encourage them to learn to swim and practice water safety — was for herself to become proficient in swimming and life saving.

Mrs. Herman Corcoran of Plusville, P.E.I. is this most unusual mother, who is pictured above with her husband and nine daughters. With the encouragement and co-operation of Red Cross Swimming Instructor, Miss Martha Meyer, Mrs. Corcoran early last summer joined the O'Leary Junior Swimming Class which was conducted at Mill River on Casumpec Bay. By September she had successfully passed the Royal Life Saving Society tests for the Bronze Medallion.

When interviewed, Mrs. Corcoran said that she felt the necessity of being able to look after her children about the water and decided that the best way to do this was for herself to learn swimming

and life saving skills. She arranged with Miss Meyer to have the children take their instruction during the day, taking her in the evening when she was somewhat free of household duties. "The anticipation of my evening swimming lessons," said Mrs. Corcoran, "seemed to give me a lift through the busy days and helped me relax after a strenuous day looking after the needs of my large family." She summed up her swimming experience by saying, "I have never felt so good in my life!"

Mrs. Corcoran is a busy farmwife and her initiative and efficiency are reflected in her home where she and her husband cooperate perfectly in caring for their fine family of girls. With her example, her girls will — unlike the old rhyme, receive this answer to the question, "Mother, may I go in for a swim?" "Yes, my darling daughter, now that you practice the safety rules, you need not fear the water."

Girl Is Top Grain Buyer

SASKATOON (CP) — Jane Polud, a 25-year-old executive from Montreal, is acknowledged in the trade as among the top grain buyers in Canada.

Miss Polud is chief buyer for Ralston Purina, one of the largest manufacturing companies in the world of poultry and livestock feeds. She was in Saskatoon for the annual meeting of the Canadian Feed Manufacturers Association.

She was appointed manager of the stock department of the company when she was 19 and recently became head buyer.

In a year, Miss Polud's purchases for her company total millions of dollars. Top male buyers here from Canada and the United States for the CFMA meeting, said Miss Polud is a top buyer in the industry in Canada.

Miss Polud agreed reluctantly to an interview, saying she feared her male competitors might misunderstand and feel she was "blowing my own horn."

She makes a boatload purchase of wheat as part of her day's work—a purchase involving an average of 125,000 bushels of wheat.

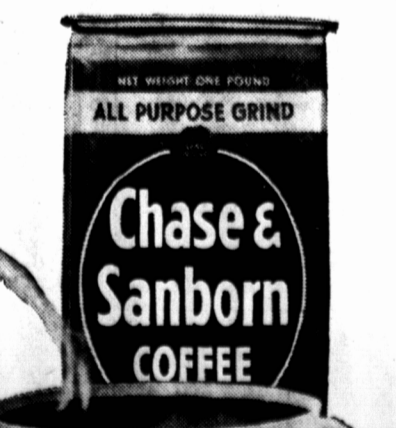
BLACK & WHITE
