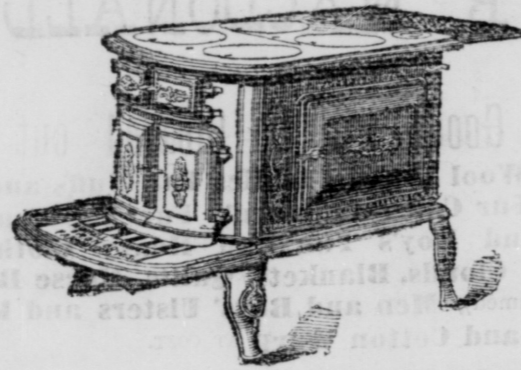
THE BROTHER OF A MILLIONAIRE SPIRITED AWAY BY TWO WOMEN.

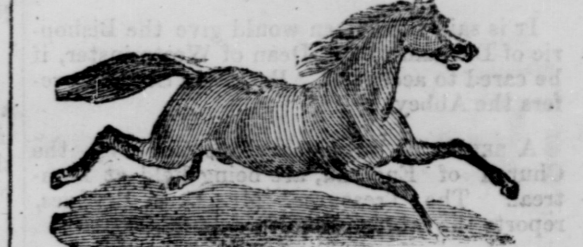
