Anti-Chinese Motion Carried.

OTTAWA, May 2. Mr Shakespeare's, British Columbia Anti-Chinese motion was rejected by the House of Commons yesterday.

Inland Revenue Bill.

The Inland Revenue Consolidation Bill passed through Committee yesterday.

"Skin the Goat" Acquitted.

DUBLIN, May 2. Fitzharris who drove the Phoenix Park assassins was acquitted yesterday. The Judge charged the jury somewhat favorably to him and recommended that he be imprisoned on charge of conspiracy to murder.

Conspiring against the Czar.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 2. A conspiracy against the Czar has been discovered among the officers of the army. Many officers have been arrested, and a large number of peasants are implicated.

A Critical Situation.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 2. The situation in Armenia is becoming critical, and the Armenian Ambassadors at Constantinople are urging reform.

A New Canal for Suez.

LONDON, May 2. A large meeting of ship-owners was held here yesterday, and the building of a new Canal at Suez discussed.

Telegraph Notes.

The appointment of twelve Bishops to Catholic sees in Poland is gazetted.

The Czar and Grand Duke Constantine, uncle of His Majesty, have become completely reconciled through the mediation of the Princess Dolgorouki.

Further rioting occurred on the 30th ult., at Port Said. The people are closing their shops. The Governor has given the charge of the Egyptian forces to a British officer.

Albert H. Beals, of the firm of Beals & Perley, of Boston, shot and killed his partner (Perley) on the Fall River steamer "Bristol," on the 30th ult., taking him for a burglar.

At the labor union meeting, in New York, on the 23d ult., a proposition to blow up Brooklyn bridge with dynamite on the day of the proposed opening, because of the day being the Queen's birthday, and because of the alleged refusal to allow working men to march over the bridge was greeted with applause.

The Rigsgdag has, by a large majority, rejected the proposal for the neutralization of Sweden. The foreign minister, in the course of the debate, declared that all powers were aware that the policy of the kingdom was a purely defensive one. He denied the truth of rumors of the existence of a secret treaty between Sweden and Germany.

Eight officers, including a colonel, have been arrested in St. Petersburg on suspicion of being connected with the Nihilists. Sixteen also have been arrested at Smalensk. It is stated that a wide-spread military conspiracy has been discovered. Documents were found at Smalensk showing that the coronation of the Czar would be undisturbed but that something very serious would happen immediately after the event.

An intimate friend of Mr. Gladstone states that the Affirmation bill is the last Liberal measure he proposes to introduce. Gladstone will retire from the Premiership as peer with the title of Earl of Midlothian. Cardinal Newman is the only dignitary of the Catholic Church who supports the Affirmation bill, and the English Catholics are astonished at his action. The Government expects to carry the bill by only a small majority.

The French expedition to Tonquin has produced such an excitement in China that it is deemed prudent to retain several French ironclads at Shanghai and Hong Kong. Therefore only a portion of the squadron in Chinese waters will proceed to Tonquin. It is expected that Captain Kergareddre, French envoy to Annam, will be appointed lieutenant governor of Tonquin when a protectorate is established. It is stated that the French minister to Peking, who was ordered to return home, has been instructed to remain at Peking until further orders.
