Cfn. Gulndon, who is with the R.C.E.M.E., flew with a party of 17 from Vancouver direct to Japan on May 2nd, 1952, and proceeded at once to Seoul, Korea, for active duty with his unit.

Previous to going to the Far East, Cfn. Gulndon was on service at White Horse, Alaska, for 20 months and for two and a half years at London, Ontario. He frequently met Islanders in Korea and quite recently conversed with Wendell Byers, Pte. Wedge and signalman Frizzle, all of Charlottetown, and Pte. Easter of O'Meary with whom he came in contact in the line of duty.

Cfn. Gulndon on the return voyage flew from Seoul to Kure where he embarked on the U.S. transport "General Howze" for Seattle, Wash. He has among his possessions a copy of the daily paper, "Howze", published aboard ship, containing news items culled from shipboard incidents and a smattering of world information.

Civil Service Act Regulations

Regulations applying to employees under the Civil Service Act are set forth in the Royal Gazette and apply as of May 7, 1953 under authority of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. They state that working hours shall be a minimum of six and three quarter hours daily, Monday through Friday, and four hours on Saturday. However, approval may be secured when the exigencies of the service require a departure from the normal hours.

Queen's County Magistrate's Court

Local Potato Planting Delayed

The cold wet weather of recent days has delayed potato planting and many farmers will have cut seed on hand, states the weekly bulletin of the Science Service Laboratory. This cut seed should be watched carefully for signs of rot for an attack by rot-producing organisms now will result in slow emergence and misses later. Hints on rot prevention are as follows:

(1) Remove the tubers from storage several days before cutting to allow them to "warm up".

(2) Disinfect the seed especially in the varieties Sebago, Irish Collier, Chippewa, and Kennebec.

(3) Not more than one bush sets should be placed in each sack when sets are to be held for a time before planting.

(4) The sacks should be left open and not piled up.

(5) The cut seed should be kept in a well-ventilated place in order that the exposed surfaces may dry off and heal.
