## Evidence Completed In Stolen Goods Case

A further remand until Wednesday, August 26th was given Mrs. Bernice Margaret Bisso, Charlottetown, following the completion of the evidence for both the crown and the defence in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday.

Mrs. Bisso charged with the possession of stolen goods appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., who adjourned the case for consideration. The only evidence presented by the defence was that of the accused, who admitted that the watch produced in court was the one that she had received from William Larkin. She denied any knowledge as to where Larkin may have obtained the watch.

Asked by defence counsel, F. A. Large, Q.C., if any member of the RCMP had suggested to her that she enter a plea of guilty in order to get it over with, Mrs. Bisso said that one had done so just prior to her first appearance in court.

Shown a black velvet purse, the accused stated that it was hers, and that it was the one taken from the suitcase in her room by the RCMP. Its contents, \$30 in silver and copper coins, she said had been saved by her from the tips she had received in her employment as waitress.

Cross examined by John P. Nicholson, crown counsel, the accused said she had known Larkin for about seven weeks, having met him sometime in July. The money contained in the purse she said was being saved toward the paying for a divorce from her husband from whom she had been separated for about a year, and who is now living in Toronto.

She denied that when taken to the jail to visit Larkin by the RCMP, she had told Larkin anything about the cops having got the stuff, money and jewellery. OTHER CASES

Adjourned until Monday, August 31st, was the case of Arthur Clinton, Charlottetown, versus the Town Planning Board.

The board has laid an information against Clinton in that several weeks ago he moved a building from its location at the corner of Escher and Grafton Streets to another location in the east end of the city, without first obtaining the necessary permit to do so.

A Charlottetown resident, Mr. George Shephard, charged with driving while intoxicated, pleaded not guilty to the charge, but entered a plea of guilty to the lesser count of driving whilst his abilities were impaired by alcohol.

Accepting the plea to the lesser offence, the magistrate meted out a fine of \$125 and costs or 20 days in Queen's County Jail. Entering a plea of not guilty to the charge of having possession of a quantity of washed wool for the purpose of manufacturing illicit spirits, Judson Everett Myers of Mount Albion was remanded until Wednesday, September 9th.

Fines of \$5 and costs or five days were meted out to residents of Charlottetown and Harrington, for operating motor vehicles with defective equipment (lights, etc.). Another city man for failure to transfer the registration of a motor vehicle.

"We're to meet with the CCF in obedience to those instructions. The CCF was the most available body to begin discussions with. Our affiliated unions are not committed to anything. They will make their own decisions after they hear what is proposed."

"Personally, I would like to see the new party formed. I think the people of Canada should be offered a choice between a left-of-centre party and a right-of-centre party."

## Arnett Howatt Passes Away Suddenly At His City Home

The death occurred suddenly at his home 108 Brighton Road yesterday of M. Arnett Howatt, chief train dispatcher with the Canadian National Railways in Charlottetown.

Although suffering for the past few years from a heart condition he had been about his home as usual yesterday when he was stricken with a fatal attack shortly after his noon meal.

Mr. Howatt who was in his 61st year had a lengthy career as a telegraph operator which dates back to the time when as a lad in his teens, he worked for Western Union here.

In 1918 he joined the CNR as a telegraph operator and in 1920 was promoted to train dispatcher. He was made acting chief train dispatcher in 1943 and was appointed to his present position in 1949. Popular among his fellow employees and the community as a whole, he was a most efficient employee.

He was an ardent golfer and curier and most of the Island's fishing spots were well known to him.

Human Values Must Match Inventions, Speaker Says

The spirit of Rotary was the theme of a vigorous appeal by Rotary Governor George Smith of Truro, N.S., to "a rededication to service and work and with a renewed faith in and respect for others."

He was speaking before the Rotary Club of Charlottetown on the occasion of his official visit at the weekly luncheon meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"I have no doubt that the scientists who worked on exploding the atom, thought mainly of its use in terms of benefiting mankind," Dr. Smith said, after describing the work involved. "People did not wake up to the mortal danger of the new discoveries until the atomic bombs were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki."

He believes that people over the entire world now realize that we must make our human values match the new inventions. We also realize that as life gets easier physically, it gets harder morally," he said.

Touching on the role of Rotary, Dr. Smith said, "Rotarians around the entire world can have a terrific influence in moulding the thoughts of many millions of people because we as a family of Rotarians realize that the peoples of the world are really not much different wherever they live. They grow up, they fall in love, they get married, and they want to raise their children in a world of peace."

"Rotary encourages each man to be loyal to his religion, home, community and country and Rotarians do not discriminate because of race, color or creed."

REAL POWER  
"As man has improved his knowledge of the atom and of the universe, we have come closer and closer to the realization that the real power of the Universe is not the shattering power of the atom, but the power of love. The love that we should have for our fellow beings, the love which our Creator has for us and which we should have for him. And in terms of these new visions of science we see hope for bringing in this new world of peace, good will and abundant living for all mankind."

Dr. Smith was introduced by President Gerry Hartlen and thanked for his outstanding address by vice-president Tom DeBlis.

Previous to the luncheon meeting, Dr. Smith, accompanied by President Gerry Hartlen paid a courtesy call on Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman at Government House.

Dr. Smith was born in Pictou County, N.S., and after attending schools in that area went to Dalhousie University from which he received a Bachelor of Science degree in 1932, and his Masters degree two years later.

Mr. Pineau was well known in Prince Edward Island where he had been employed with the Bank of Nova Scotia in Charlottetown, Kensington and Albany. From 1925 to 1932 he served as accountant with the bank of Sydney, N.S.

While employed at Charlottetown, he was active in dramatic circles and performed on many occasions on the stage of the old Prince Edward theatre. He was also very interested in music and was for several years a member of the League of the Cross band.

For the past several years, the late Mr. Pineau was employed as accountant with Crescent Jewellers at New Glasgow.

He is survived by his wife, the former Gladys MacCormac of Charlottetown, and six children, namely Aileen Claire (Mrs. Lawrence Perkins), Phyllis (Mrs. William Pitt), Marguerite (Mrs. John Ryan), Miriam Pineau R.N. at Truro, Douglas with the RCAF at Sydney and Winston at home.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Aileen J. MacDonald and Mrs. Alice Morris of Charlottetown, and two brothers, Wilfred P. Pineau, Calgary, Alberta and J. Pineau Callaghan in Charlottetown.

Funeral services will be held in New Glasgow.

Silence About Appointment Is Difficult For Mrs. Sevigny

MONTREAL (CP)—Mrs. Pierre Sevigny says she still shudders when she thinks how she had to keep mum about her husband's appointment last week as associate defence minister of Canada.

She was with her husband when Prime Minister Diefenbaker proposed the cabinet appointment.

Here's how she told the story in an interview:

"We arrived in Ottawa and were led into the prime minister's office where he was awaiting our arrival. We sat down, feeling nervous but trying not to show it."

"You know, Pierre," the prime minister began, "it appears that you have learned a great deal since coming to the House and we feel that you deserve consideration for higher duties."

LIFE-LONG AMBITION  
"Well, it seems that he went on like this for hours, when it was actually about a minute. Then he sprang it on us: 'We would like to associate you to the cabinet, as associate defence minister.' My husband just paled. For a long few seconds he said nothing. Then quietly: 'This has been my ambition all my life.'"

Mrs. Sevigny said the prime minister cautioned them not to disclose the appointment until it had been officially announced by his office.

"Well, you could just imagine me" she said. "How would I ever keep a secret like that until Pierre was officially sworn in?"
