Lessons of the Election.

The first and most obvious is that the Government have been rather too economical and too prudent to please the people of some of the country districts.

Yet it is difficult to believe that Belfast, Murray Harbor, and Tighnish are in favor of large expenditures and taxation—the one is the complement of the other; and we are forced to the conclusion that there must be some hidden causes at work in these districts, and to caution the Government against going too far in the direction towards which the people seem, by the result, to point them.

It is rather remarkable that the towns, many of whose tradespeople have had cause to complain against the Government better than the country districts, in whose interests the economical policy was carried out!

It is also a rather remarkable and cheering fact that while the Oppositionists have triumphed in several districts, a analysis of the returns shows that the Liberal-Conservative polled nearly four thousand more votes than the Oppositionists did.

It is quite evident that if there had been a proper organization of the Party, the Liberal-Conservative would have had a very handsome majority.

If there had been organizations the elements would not have been taken by surprise, the Opposition could not have made capital out of a cry that the elections were sprung upon the country, there would have been Liberal-Conservative candidates ready to take the field, there would have been no delay and no dissatisfaction; and in the existing state of public opinion a glorious victory would have been assured.

The great lesson of the contest, to the Liberal-Conservative Party is, Organization is wanted—ORGANIZE!

Election Notes.

NEW LONDON DISTRICT.

The returns from this splendid district, as reported yesterday, were far below the mark. The following figures are supplied by H. M. Campbell:—

Thus, the Liberal-Conservatives polled in the New London District 301 votes more than their opponents—yet only got one man in. This is too bad, and shows the necessity there is for organization. Hon. The return of the Commissioner of Public Works by such an overwhelming majority shows what the independent electors of Crapaud, Braselane, Springfield and New London think of the "starvation" cry. They think, and say, it is false.

BELFAST DISTRICT.

At last, we have news from Belfast; and regret to find that the Oppositionists there have won the day. Messrs. Nicholson and Crawford had served the district well; they are both sterling good men; and supporting as they do, the most economical and prudent administration that ever held the reins of power in this Province, their return was deemed a foregone conclusion. A NOVEL EXPERIMENT.

The St. John Telegraph says: As there are many valuable properties in the town of Portland situated a long way from a water plug, and where there is no possibility of using a steam fire engine to advantage in case of a conflagration, a novel experiment was tried last evening by the Portland firemen, which it is thought will obviate the difficulty to a certain extent. Both engines of the department were taken to Chesley's foundry and one of them was attached to a fire hydrant. A stretch of hose about 50 feet in length was run out and the two engines connected together. Steam was then turned on and the pumps of both engines set in motion, the idea being to pump the water from one engine to the other and from the second engine to the fire. The experiment worked admirably, the second engine throwing a stream as far and as powerful as had it been attached directly to the hydrant. By using both engines it is thought there will be no difficulty in reaching many buildings now beyond the reach of one engine. The experiment is certainly a very ingenious one and before it was demonstrated to be practical for the night it could be accomplished. Experiments like the above have been made in Charlottetown years ago.

Planting a Maypole on the ice on Monday, as they did at Beacon on Monday, is scarcely the correct thing. This is another of Mr. Vermer's outrages which should not be tolerated. The only thing that a happy man can plead in extenuation of his mischievous conduct is that the Beacon people could have had a better rate on New Year's day if they had felt so inclined.

The Assassination in Dublin.

CLUE TO THE ASSASSINS.

ARRESTS.

DUBLIN, May 9.

The draymen who were nearly run into by the car supposed to have contained the assassins of the Secretaries were returning from Maynooth, where they met them. The occupant of the car appeared to be greatly excited, and motioned the draymen hastily to clear the way. They think they would identify two of them at least.

At an inquest yesterday in the bodies of Cavendish and Burke medical evidence was given that the victims had apparently been stabbed simultaneously before and behind with long bowie knives. The wounds all appeared to have been inflicted with exactly similar weapons.

Heavy rewards are offered for the apprehension of the assassins.

NEW YORK, May 9.

It is stated that Minister West at Washington has authorized the British Consul in this city to offer a reward for information leading to the detection of the Dublin assassins.

LONDON, May 9.

The Queen will visit London to-day, when she will give an audience to Mr. Gladstone.

DUBLIN, May 9.

Two men, named Bailey and Arman, were arrested here while loitering in Phoenix Park; the former had a dagger in his possession. Several other arrests have been made. Additional information regarding the assassinations has come to light. Two bicyclists, fitters, in the employ of the railway company, state that they passed the spot where the murders were committed.

They saw the assassins strike their victims and heard Lord Frederick cry out, "Ah, you villain," to his assailant, who then stabbed him again. Lord Frederick fell over against the bicycle of one of the fitters who was coming to his assistance; but the murderers, with bloody knives, made towards him, and both bicyclists therefore got away as fast as possible. They saw the car on the road but could not see the driver's face. The Government offer a reward of ten thousand pounds.

BOSTON, May 9.

A largely attended indignation meeting at Faneuil Hall to-night, to express disapproval by the Irishman of Boston and vicinity, of the recent murders, and \$5000 was subscribed as a reward.

The Irish Tragedy.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

Capt. Greatrix, of the dragoons, who thought the matter had been a drunken row, said, as the murderers passed, "You have roughly handled them." They replied roughly, "You be damned." Greatrix says he can identify one of the men concerned in the assassinations, and a gate-keeper of the Park says he can identify two.

The Chancellor, the Law Adviser and Gen. Steele, commander of the forces, are at present with Earl Spencer.

There were eight gaping wounds in the body of Cavendish and eleven in Burke. A special messenger left London for Dublin hastily this morning.

The Times says it is imperatively necessary that Mr. Gladstone should prove to England, without an hour's delay, that he is at length come to understand the true nature of the Irish difficulty. No attempt to explain the murder as an accidental one, or as a last help less effort at organizing disaffection will avail with those who advocate Forster's measures as indispensable for restoring order.

The London Standard says that Burke, an Irishman and a Roman Catholic, one would have thought that these circumstances would have disarmed hostility in his case.

The London Times says: "It is no thought that Lord Frederick Cavendish and Burke were both deliberately selected for assassination. During the procession in Dublin, on Saturday, a man enquired three times whether Cavendish was in the procession. The Chief Secretary at last lifted his hat and told him his name. The man replied, 'Thank you; that will do.' Two men on horseback also watched the procession in a suspicious manner."

The London Central News declares that Mr. Forster has been re-appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, and will start for Dublin immediately. It says it is understood that the policy of the Government will include stern repressive measures.

Parfoul says: "There seems an unhappy destiny presiding over Ireland, which always comes at a moment when there seems some chance for the country, to destroy the hopes of her best friends."

Lord Frederick Charles Cavendish, M. P., was a son of the Duke of Devonshire, and the next youngest brother of the Marquis of Hartington, Secretary for India. He was 49 years of age and was married to the daughter of Baron Lytton. He was the private Secretary to Lord Granville from 1859 till 1864, and acted in a similar capacity to Mr. Gladstone, from July, 1872, to August, 1873, when he was appointed one of the Junior Lords of the Treasury. On Mr. Gladstone's return to power, in 1880, Lord Cavendish became Financial Secretary of the Treasury, at a salary of \$10,000 per annum. He represented the northern division of the West riding at Yorkshire from 1865 until his death. At the last general election he polled 10,818 votes and secured a majority of 3,768 over his Conservative opponent. In London, on Thursday, it was freely asserted that the appointment of Lord Frederick Cavendish as Chief Secretary of Ireland was an endeavor to conciliate the whig members of the Cabinet. The home rule members of Parliament were much disappointed at the selection of Lord Cavendish for that post. The Daily News regarded the appointment of Lord Cavendish with regret and wonder, and considered that a great opportunity had been thrown away.
