Local and Other Items.

VICTORIA'S CONTRIBUTION.—The city of Victoria has contributed so far two car-loads of provisions and \$5,000 cash towards the relief of the sufferers by the fire at New Westminster. The total insurance amounts to \$1,030,306.

PROBABLY FATAL ACCIDENT.—Mr James McArthur, of Aylmer, Ont. was almost boiled to death at Eastman's Springs, a few nights ago. He got into a bath at the Dominion House, but was taken ill, and was unable to turn off the hot water. It is feared that his injuries will prove fatal.

JAPAN PROGRESSING.—Civilization in Japan will move forward now in a street car. A St. Louis company has received an order from the Japanese Government for 250 cars to be shipped within 90 days, and to cost \$300,000. "A street scene in Tokio" will have a more familiar look in stereopticon views hereafter.

A NEW INDUSTRY.—A new industry in the fish curing way recently established at Centreville, Digby, is being well tested this season. The canning of herrings had never been undertaken in Digby before, and the present indications are that the venture will prove very successful. The fish are brought from Grand Manan and forty or fifty men find employment in putting them up.—Annapolis Spectator.

A TIGER STORY.—According to the Straits Times, two Chinamen named Chau Swee and Chau Teh, met a tiger, Chau Teh ran away, but Chau Swee remained and "with a stick which he had in his hand, landed a fatal blow on the tiger's head." When they returned to Seremban Chau Swee obtained the Government reward for the slain tiger. He appears to have been the better prevaricator of the two.

BALLOON ASCENSION.—The highest balloon ascension on record was made from the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, England, a few days ago, by Stanley Spencer and Dr. Benson. An altitude of 27,500 feet was attained, and a temperature of 61 degrees below freezing point. The occupants of the car were compelled to breathe compressed oxygen in tubes at 25,000 feet, the air had become so rarified. And 65 degrees below zero is nearer the North Pole than Professor Andree succeeded in getting.

A QUEER ARGUMENT.

One of the arguments used against the coming plebiscite is that if the Government passed a prohibitory law it would be violated—it would be impossible to enforce it.

The strangeness of this argument is found in the fact that because a rum-seller will violate the law of the land, therefore he should be protected in his lawlessness and not interfered with in any way.

Why should the violator of this law be protected any more than the violator of the law against theft or murder?

It seems to be generally accepted that the liquor traffic is the source of great evil; indeed, that it is a curse to the community and, further, that thousands of homes would be brighter, and hearts lighter if the drunkard would become a sober man; and furthermore that no drunkard can inherit the kingdom of heaven; and yet, the mystery of mysteries is that nothing must be done to save the drunkard from the curse of his life, and his family from poverty and misery.

When an effort is made to shut up the road to death and damnation, to remove the temptation from the path of the poor drunkard, somebody cries out, "No; don't do it. These men will drag the poor fellow over the fence you raise and lead him on to death and hell. Don't hinder the rum-seller, let him do it without let or hindrance; yea, give him the chance to pay by license for the privilege of ruining poor souls and spoiling the peace of homes and countries."

What an argument! Because some lawless, lazy money-grabs want to sell rum to men who are unfortunate enough have cultivated an appetite; and will do it in spite of law, or anything else, therefore stand back and say nothing, but let them do it. Apply this argument to any other acts of lawlessness and then laugh at your own ignorance and folly. It is always right to make it easy to do right, and hard to do wrong, and prohibition will do that with sellers and drinkers.

LONG DISTANCE MAILS

A letter sent from New York to Bangkok, Siam, travels overland to San Francisco and thence by water, reaching its destination in about 43 days, having been carried nearly 13,000 miles. A letter mailed here for Adelaide, Australia, also goes via San Francisco, travels 12,845 miles and is delivered usually within 35 days. New York mail destined for Calcutta goes by way of London, traveling 11,120 miles in 29 days, while mail sent from this city to Cape Town, goes 125 miles farther in two days' less time.

Mail communication between New York and Hongkong ordinarily consumes one month of time. The letters go by way of San Francisco and cover 10,500 miles of distance. To reach Melbourne, Australia, from this city a letter will travel 12,265 miles in about 32 days, and to reach Sydney a letter will travel 11,570 miles in 31 days. The mail route from New York to Yokohama, via San Francisco, is 7,348 miles long, and about 22 days are consumed in transit. To go to Honolulu from this city a letter travels 5,645 miles in 13 days.

Leaving New York on steamer days, mail matter is scheduled to reach Rome in about ten days, Madrid in ten days, London and Liverpool in eight days, Rotterdam in nine days, St. Petersburg in 11 days, Vienna in nine days, Paris in eight days, Berlin in nine days and Athens and Alexandria in 14 days. Communication with South American ports is much slower. It takes 24 days for a letter to go from New York to Rio Janeiro, which is only about 50 miles farther from this city than is Alexandria. Mail matter going from New York to Buenos Ayres, which is 8,045 miles distant, consumes 29 or 30 days.—New York Times.
