Former Islander Dies In Dover

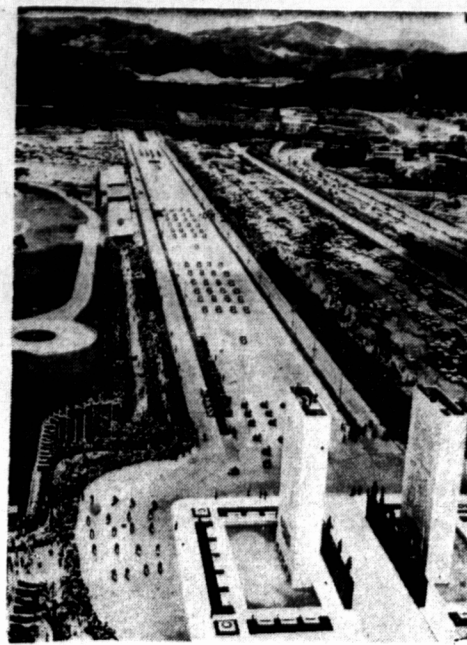

Cash Advances On Grain To Be Decided In Parliament

SASKATOON (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Monday any decision to initiate cash advance payments for farm-stored grain must first be endorsed by Parliament. The new session opens Oct. 14.

He also stressed that Canada's new concept in approaching the problems of the next 25 years must include a plan for national development of northern areas.

The prime minister made the remarks at a press conference. He was to open Saskatoon's annual exhibition Monday night and return later to Ottawa by air.

Mr. Diefenbaker said he will make no announcement of new cabinet appointments or other important developments upon his arrival in Ottawa. Five cabinet posts, including that of agriculture minister, still have to be filled.

When asked if he is prepared to initiate cash advances in line with election campaign promises, Mr. Diefenbaker replied that nothing could be done before the new session of parliament.

FOLLOW PLEDGE
"This or any other problem of this nature must come before Parliament," he said. "We are not going to use order-in-council. That was a stand I took during the election campaign and one I certainly intend to follow."

The prime minister, just returned from a fishing holiday at Lac la Ronge in Northern Saskatchewan, emphasized the need for national development of northern areas.

"There must be great expansions in northern development and we must assure those areas will be preserved for us," he said. "The polar areas and the sections south of there hold tremendous possibilities for our survival."

He said just as Sir John A. Macdonald at Confederation had focussed attention on linking the East and West, so today the time had arrived to look to the north

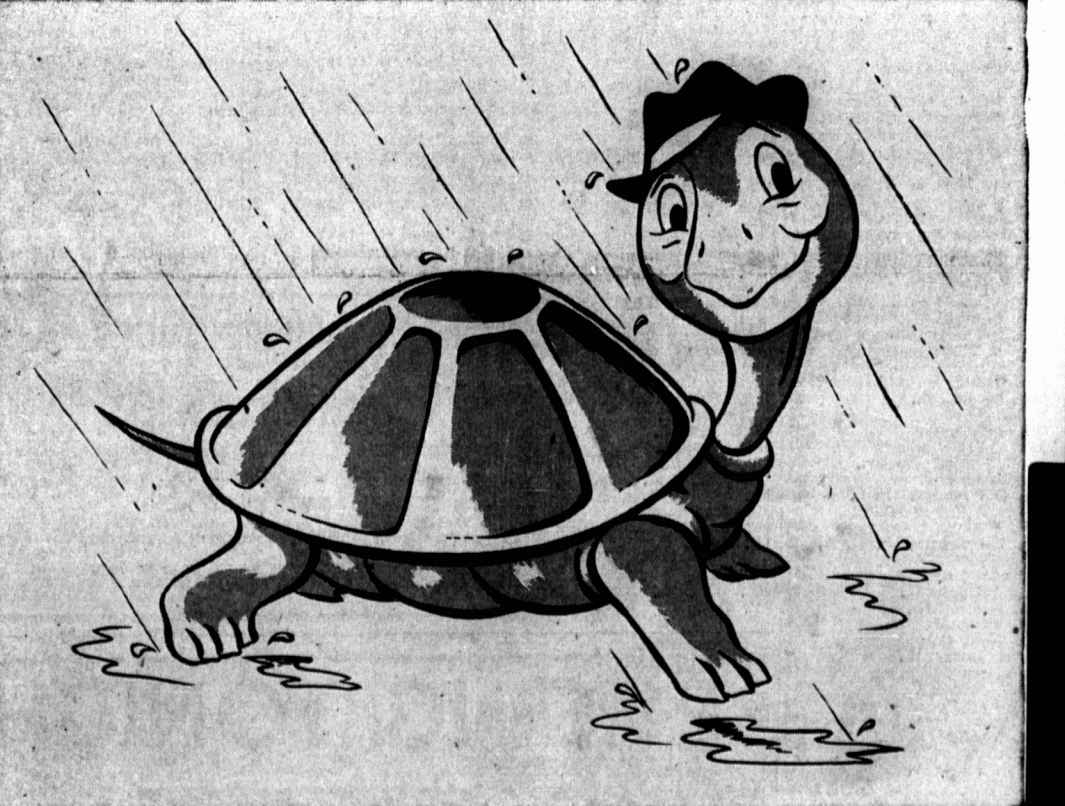
PILOT WILLS BODY

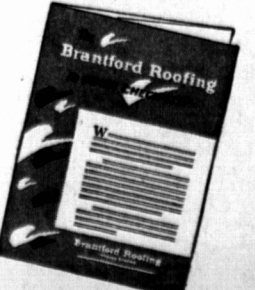
