



### What Is Ground Controlled Approach?

This is some of the equipment which will be on display at the centennial aviation show to be held at the Charlottetown Airport on July 2. The public is cordially invited to attend this show and see air force activities at first hand.

The technicians in the picture are shown working on communications equipment which forms part of the ground controlled approach or GCA system used daily by the RCAF.

The GCA system was developed by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology of Boston during the last war as a means of dependable and accurate landing of aircraft at airports during bad weather.

Air traffic must frequently land in bad weather when clouds and fog completely obliterate the field from view. Under these conditions the pilot must have some means of bringing his aircraft down to a safe, sure landing. GCA supplies this vital aid.

Positioned on one of the runways will be found the GCA truck and trailer, a portable, self-contained diesel operated radar station inside the unit can be found
