Bogus Cheque Artist Outlines His Career

On a hot summer night in a small Florida city, the man we'll call Dan got fed up with everything in his life: his wife, his family, his job.

He was on duty as a clerk at a car rental office. Between 10 and 11 p.m., he methodically made out four fake credit cards, gathered a stack of business stationery, invoices, 200 company cheques, and put a cheque-writing machine into one of the firm's cars. He drove around town cashing personal cheques and by midnight had \$900 in his pocket.

Then he drove out of town. Dan, the conservatively handsome, college-educated son of a well-known family—thus became a man of several aliases and no ties. He began a new career: a cheque artist. This is one of the elite in the world of crime—the hot cheque artist who spends freely and always pays with worthless cheques.

"I thought about this a long time," he says. "I never knew a chequeman or learned tricks from anyone."

"I simply studied it, in terms of logic. It is almost like a mathematical exercise. I compare it to chess. You want to obtain a certain objective, but you want to disguise it so your opponent doesn't know what you are after or how you're getting there."

At 26, there are hard lines around Dan's mouth and his smile always seems weary. His gestures have a nervousness about them. He looks 40.

Dan always travelled by car and always tried to make it appear he travelled by plane or train.

"First, I would drive to the airport and check a bag there, and then I would go to a railroad depot and check another bag. Then I'd go into the centre of town and put the car into a garage."

"I'd take a taxicab to the airport, check the plane arrivals, call a hotel and say I just arrived on the 4-02 flight, get my bag and check into the hotel. Then I'd go to the railroad depot and repeat the same routine, checking into another hotel. I used the same name in both hotels."

Why two hotels? "It gives you a chance to cash more cheques. There's generally no problem in cashing cheques while you are a guest of a hotel."

STAY FIVE DAYS Dan took his time, staying in a city four and five days, writing cheques wherever and whenever he could.

"All the cheques I wrote were on Florida banks. I knew it took a week or more for a cheque to clear and come back NSF (not sufficient funds)."

"My favorite pigeons were men's clothing stores. I'd always try to be served by the oldest looking man in the store. I knew salesmen worked on commission and I figured that a man in his 40s or 50s would have a family and try to sell me everything in sight. I also found that an older employee is generally empowered to authorize cashing a cheque. Of course, I'd write a cheque for \$50 or \$75 more than the bill."

His grand plan was to accumulate \$50,000 or \$100,000 and then settle in one of the cosmopolitan cities of South America—Rio, Buenos Aires or Santiago.

In six months, during which he worked most big U.S. cities and dozens of smaller ones, he cashed cheques totalling about \$25,000. At this point, he was in San Francisco—and broke.

"I spent it as fast as I got it. Mostly women, but also gambling. It was here that he violated the chequeman's cardinal rule: Never hit the same place twice.

At the second table the bidding went: Clubs were never mentioned at this table. South led the king of clubs against five diamonds doubled. North overtook with the ace and returned his singleton spade.

South won't with the ace and played the jack of spades which North ruffed. North returned a club, knowing from the opening lead that his partner had the queen, but East ruffed, cashed the ace of diamonds, and later lost a diamond to the king to go down two—500 points.

As a result, the net score for the North-South pair at this table was that their team lost 150 points on the deal however they missed a golden opportunity to exact an 1100-point penalty against five diamonds doubled.

The fault was largely North's. When he ruffed the jack of spades, he should have returned a heart. South would trump the heart, lead another spade for North to ruff, and another heart lead would then produce the sixth trick for the defense.

The hand demonstrates the value of the suit-direction convention. When South led the jack of spades, having a wide variety of spades to play from, he had chosen to play his highest spade, thus indicating he wanted the high suit returned (as between hearts and clubs) after North ruffed.

Red Membership Said 40 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The total Communist party membership in the world is approximately 40,000,000, a U.S. government analysis showed.

The Communist state parties, of which the Chinese with 17,000,000 members is the largest, account for 36,000,000 of the total, the report said.

The largest parties outside the Soviet orbit remain the Indonesian and Italian with an estimated 1,750,000 in Indonesia and about 1,200,000 and 1,500,000 in Italy.

Rochester of Toronto to colonel and his appointment as commander of the Canadian units with the United Nations Force in the Middle East. An officer of the Royal Canadian Engineers, Col.
