Local Co-op Association Has Successful Year

The Central Farmers Co-operative Association last night reported a sales turnover of more than \$350,000 and a net profit of savings of nearly \$6,000 in the Co-op Super Market for the year ending January 31.

Mr. Guy Rodd, Brackley, President of the Association presided at the meeting which was well attended. Mr. Rodd was re-elected president for the third successive year.

Net sales for the year amounted to \$353,904.14. Cost of sales and operating expenses amounted to \$347,926.36, leaving a profit of \$5,977.78.

President Guy Rodd was elected over the financial report presented by accountant Leo Corcoran. His election was due to the fact, he stated, that the Association showed a deficit of \$2,971 at their annual meeting in May last year while this year they showed a profit.

He lauded the work of Mr. MacLean, under whose management the deficit was erased and the profit accumulated. He also congratulated the members of the staff and the directors.

The Super Market is shooting for the \$500,000 mark in sales this year and hope to show a profit of \$15,000 reported Mr. MacLean. He stated that nearly all store departments were showing bigger profits and greater efficiency.

Return Of Car Not Provided For In Statute

An unusual case came before the Supreme Court recently, in the matter of an application by William D. Stevenson of Windsor, for the return of a car of which he is part owner and which was seized by the R. C. M. P. in connection with an offence under the Excise Act.

The car, a 1950 Plymouth coupe, was seized last December and Stevenson was charged with unlawful possession of spirits contrary to Section 169 (1) of the Excise Act.

Stevenson and his father, Robert L. Stevenson, petitioned the Supreme Court for an order that their respective interests in the car be not affected by the seizure. Mr. Justice M. R. McGuigan made an order that the interest of the father be not so affected, but ruled that the applicable section, No. 169A, which is for the benefit of anyone "other than the person accused of the offence," did not permit William Stevenson as an accused—even though he had subsequently been found not guilty—to apply for a similar order.

On the western front, northwest of Seoul, the Republican capital. On the central front, a tank-infantry patrol reported the first contact with the Reds in several days. It engaged the Communists in an hour-long skirmish a mile north of Chumchon, 15 miles south of parallel 38.

On the east-central front, additional South Korean patrols crossed the parallel at several points between Inje and the east coast. Inje is 25 miles inland.

Chinese Discontented

Rumblings of Chinese discontent with the Russians were reported by American officers. Associated Press correspondent Jim Becker, said these sources reported the Chinese "are highly disgusted with the Russians for not supplying large quantities of tanks and planes supposedly promised Red Chinese leaders by the Kremlin."

It was believed the Chinese were stock-piling their Russian-supplied planes at Sintuju. The Red planes on the ground "were blasted to pieces," AP correspondent Robert Euston reported.
