ARRESTS FOR DRUNKENNESS.—An exchange says: In Bangor, Maine, under a prohibitory law, there were 1382 arrests for drunkenness last year, out of a population of less than 25,000. In St John, under license, there were 707 arrests out of a population of more than 40,000.

GRANDFATHER VOTED CONSERVATIVE.—A story is current in railway circles that Mr. Blair and Mr. Killam stopped their palace car during their recent trip long enough to dismiss a painter who was working on one of the iron bridges in the region of the Miramichi. The minister had heard, so the story goes, that the painter's grandfather had voted conservative fifteen years ago, and this was considered good ground for dismissal. The Moncton Times has not yet been able to verify the story.

INSURANCE STATISTICS.—According to the Statistical Year Book published by the Canadian Government, in the twenty-seven years from January 1st, 1869, to December 1st, 1896, the people of Canada paid to the fire insurance companies of Great Britain, Canada and the United States, \$126,947,254 in premiums. During the same period the insurance companies returned to the people the sum of \$86,953,343 for fire losses. In other words, the companies' profits from their Canadian business in twenty-seven years amounted to \$49,993,911, or nearly a million and a half of dollars every year.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—The marriage of Mr. S. D. Campbell, of Uigg, and Miss Margaret Bruce, of Valleyfield, daughter of the late A. D. Bruce, was solemnized on Wednesday evening last. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. D. B. McLeod, at the residence of the bride's mother, in the presence of the immediate friends and relatives of the participants. Miss Mary McLeod, of Orzell, was bridesmaid, and Mr. A. A. Bruce, of Charlotte-town, supported the groom. Very many useful and handsome presents were received by the bride. After the ceremony supper was served, and at its conclusion the happy couple left for their home in Uigg, followed by the best wishes of all who enjoy their acquaintance. WESTERN NOTES.

The parishioners of Tignish presented the exceedingly popular and zealous assistant priest of that place, Rev. J. S. Turbide, with a magnificent fur coat and gloves to match, all made to special order by the first firm of Montreal, in St. Mary's Hall on the evening of the 8th inst. Two flattering addresses, one in English read by E. Hackett, Esq., and the other in French read by S. F. Perry, Esq. M. P., were also presented the talented young clergyman. There was a great concourse of people, and the Revs. D. M. McDonald, A. E. Burke, and Dr. Chaisson, expressed their delight at the manner in which their worthy conferee was appreciated by those in whose interests he labored. Speeches were also made by Dr. Murphy, J. C. McCarthy, Charles Dalton, Joseph Arsenault, J. A. Brennan and J. F. Boute.

The festival of the Immaculate Conception was celebrated with great pomp in all the Catholic Churches on Wednesday.
