### Desert Airline Operates At Capacity Despite Bumpy Ride

EL BALLAH, Egypt (CP)—The "Rutherford run" from nearby Abu Suweir to the desert outposts of the United Emergency Force is an experience that tends to make the passenger think fondly of his last ride on a roller-coaster.

And his planes have to fly so low security-conscious Egyptians can spot their UN markings. Night flying is out, except in emergencies, mostly because landing-light systems are unavailable.

The composite squadron maintains regular schedules to the outposts, the Dakotas sticking to the landing strips while the Otters choose a highway when they can, picking their way between the boulders if they have to.

In an emergency, flare paths are strung for night landings. But Canadian Army signals have co-operated to rig a successful makeshift homing system against the danger of sudden sandstorms blotting out desert landmarks.

In fact, Wing Cmdr. Arthur J. Byford of Ottawa and Montreal, the UNEF's air staff chief, has had to introduce a priority system to handle traffic on Sqdn. Ldr. Vern Rutherford's two Dakotas and four Otters, which haul supplies and handle medical evacuations for the network of desert stations.

Rutherford, a veteran of the Canadian bush and northern treetop run, doesn't supply the roller-coaster effect as entertainment. It's caused by low flying over the hot desert in extreme air turbulence.
