

# Maritime Board Of Trade Subject Of Talk At Rotary

—Mr. Alan Holman of Charlottetown was guest speaker yesterday at the regular weekly luncheon meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club held at the Summerside Restaurant, J. C. (Bud) Mountain in the chair.

Mr. Holman addressed the Rotary gathering of the Maritime Board of Trade, of which he is president, and on the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council. The guest speaker pointed out that the Maritime Board of Trade is an organization interested in the welfare of the Maritimes as a whole, and does not promote projects for individual communities.

He said the board has accomplished a great deal in the past few years and that last year, for the first time since confederation, the premiers of the four Atlantic Provinces met in Halifax to discuss matters concerning their provinces. This meeting was held under the auspices of the Maritime Board of Trade, said Mr. Holman.

The Atlantic Provinces Economic Council was formed at this gathering and was modelled after a council set up in the New England States nearly 20 years ago, with much success, the guest speaker related.

The purpose of the council, in the main, is to improve the economic conditions of the Atlantic Provinces.

Mr. Holman stated there are many industries in the Maritimes that don't prosper because many people don't want to buy Maritime products. He said probably one of the reasons for this is that they haven't been packaged as attractively as they might be. He said retailers and individual consumers as well should investigate the many products that are available in the Maritimes, stressing that Maritimers should be buying Maritime products when they, if not all companies, favorably with products bought elsewhere.

Mr. Holman stated that he personally feels there is a great future for the Maritimes and all.

## NATO Officials Expect Agreement On A-Weapons

PARIS (Reuters)—Atlantic pact officials said Tuesday night they are confident that an agreement will be reached this week satisfying both politicians and generals on the use of atomic weapons to repel any attack against Western Europe.

This issue, which had been expected to provoke one of the first disputes within the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, will be discussed by 14 foreign ministers on the pact's ministerial council meeting here Friday. External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson will represent Canada.

The final decision to use atomic weapons will be taken by the governments, not by Gen. Alfred Gruenther, the supreme commander, acting on his own initiative, the officials said.

not all of them nuclear—during the next three years too readily assumed that SHAPE would be able to counter any military incursion by atomic weapons and tactical atomic bombing.

Denmark, one of the most exposed members of the alliance, objected. Britain, Belgium and Holland, supported by France, it is understood, also insisted that their governments must be consulted before atoms were used to repel an enemy.

But this procedure would not prevent Gruenther from basing his plans on the assumption that atomic weapons would be used to repel an invasion from the East.

## U.S. Decision Touches Off Demonstrations In Athens

ATHENS (Reuters) — Forty-nine students and 25 policemen were injured Tuesday in violent street demonstrations against the United States decision to support continued British colonial rule of Cyprus. Thousands of students, armed with oranges, clubs and chair legs, screamed "shame on the Americans" and tried in vain to battle through police cordons to the U.S. and British embassies.

Black-robed Greek Orthodox priests led the youthful marchers. When firemen, working alongside police, turned their hoses on the demonstrators outside the American mission building, the priests tried to slash the hoses with knives.

Greece demands the right of self-determination for the population of Cyprus which is predominantly Greek in origin. Britain is boycotting the debate and the United States Monday announced it will vote against the Greek resolution.
