DecBrisley Crescent. Thirty-four (34) buildings were connected with the water works system and twenty-four (24) buildings with the sewerage system.

In last year's report we mentioned the need of a larger pump at the Western Sewer Station. The new pump was called late in the year for this equipment.

No debentures were issued during the year but to finance the Malpeque Road it was necessary to arrange for an overdraft at The Royal Bank which was covered by a debenture issue when the final payments for the equipment become due and payable.

At the close of the year we had the following balances in Construction Accounts at the Bank:

Operating expenses were considerably lower than in the previous year. This was largely due to the fact that because of the high water level in the North River Station shut down except for testing purposes during the entire year.

Water Construction Account, Dr. \$5,499.48. Over 1000 orders were issued during the year for turning on and off water. 907 of these being caused by persons moving.

At the close of the year there are 3,093 dwellings, stores etc. using water supplied by this Department. 2,780, or about 90 per cent of these water users have plumbing fixtures. This percentage is steadily increasing each year.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER. Charlottetown, P. E. I., December 31, 1938. To His Worship the Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Health, Sir:

I have the honour to submit a report of the year's work in the Department of Public Health for the City of Charlottetown.

That the general public are becoming more and more aware of the services rendered by the Department of Health is evidenced by the increasing numbers who avail themselves of these services.

Probably the most outstanding event for the year in the field of Public Health was the skin testing of the children in Prince Street School for Tuberculosis. This request coming to the Department from the parents indicates that progress is being made along scientific lines and augurs well for the coming generation.

As pleased to report that during the year under survey no serious epidemic visited the City. Sporadic cases of Scarlet Fever, Typhoid Fever and Spinal Meningitis occurred but suitable quarantine measures were taken and the morbidity rate was kept at a minimum.

In reviewing the work done in the Provincial Laboratory for the city along lines of diagnostic purposes for disease prevention one

discovers that each year the work is increasing as the public avail themselves more and more of this service. A daily examination is made on City's water supply and reports are rendered to the Water Commission. These reports which were, in the past, not always satisfactory influenced the Water Commissioners to install two chlorinating units in the Water Supply system last summer.

The nursing Division has shown much activity during the year in the City Schools. A quick inspection is made each autumn when the schools re-open after the summer holidays. Any children having certain skin conditions or communicable diseases are temporarily excluded.

Each year Diphtheria Immunizing clinics are held in each of the City Schools and many school and pre-school children are given pre-school immunization. Clinics are held in the Provincial Sanatorium where all indigent children are vaccinated free of charge.

Only one case of Typhoid Fever was reported and investigated but the source of infection could not be ascertained. This case, though recovered, still remains a carrier and reports to the Department periodically for further examination.

All meat and milk consumed in the City is inspected by the Meat and Poultry Inspector, Dr. I. E. Croken, V. S. whose report appears elsewhere. Dairy herds supplying milk to the City are inspected as well as the barns and milking utensils periodically and reports furnished by the Inspector.

In conclusion permit me, Sir, to express my appreciation of the splendid support you and the members of the City Council have rendered both to myself and my staff in furthering Public Health in the City.
