SUPREME COURT.

SATURDAY, June 30.

Geo. Farrah vs. Robert VanDersting; action for false arrest. An interlocutory judgment having been obtained, a rule nisi was granted to chambers to show cause why the damages in this case should not be assessed by a jury before a Judge of the Supreme Court instead of before the sheriff and a jury. The rule was this morning argued, Mr. Hazard, Q. C., showing cause against the rule and Mr. Stewart, Q. C., for the rule. Court discharged the rule, with costs fixed at ten dollars, holding that there was nothing in this case to warrant the taking of the matter out of the sheriff's hands. The damages will therefore be assessed before Sheriff Robertson and a jury.

L. E. Prowse and another vs. Chas. J. Patton, an absent or absconding debtor. The rule to show cause why the absent debtor or attachment and proceedings thereon should not be set aside was commenced this morning but not concluded. W. E. Bentley argued in support of the rule; Attorney-General Mackinnon for plaintiffs.

Court adjourned till Tuesday at 11 a. m.
