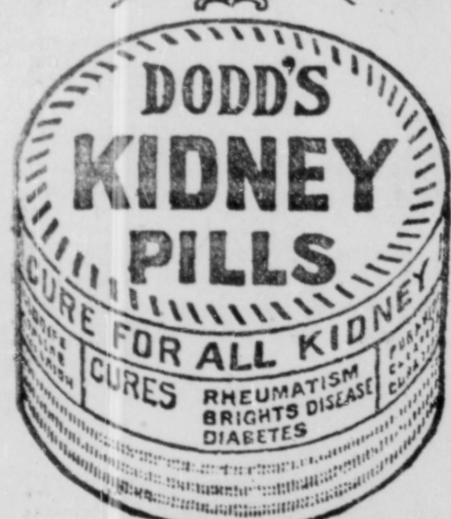

enough time to the patients. Some attendants had told him if they were sworn they would tell him how much time the Doctor gave. Mr. Blanchard and he visited Dr. Frazer when he was ill. He was informed Dr. Blanchard saw him Saturday morning. He was interested in him as a acquaintance. The patients used to go to bed 7 o'clock as reported by Mr. McPhail whereas the bye-law said 8 o'clock. This was going on for 4 years. The Medical Superintendent changed it to 8 o'clock. When he and Mr. Blanchard went through the wards patients and attendants complained of being kept up. On Tuesday morning the Medical Superintendent told him that he was overruling bye-laws by requesting Mr. McPhail to allow the patients to retire at 7 o'clock. Dr. Blanchard could not have seen Frazer from Saturday till Tuesday. Witness thought proper case was not given by the Medical Superintendent and that a resident doctor was a necessity. He was made to understand that the Medical Superintendent did not give enough time to patients. He brought to the notice of the Board the fact of the doctor's absence during Frazer's critical condition.

Dr. Blanchard—I severely reprimanded the officials for not reporting Dr. Frazer's condition.

Witness—Always visited the storeroom. He found the meat good and sound. The bread was generally good, rather coarse. He did not know anything of the bull beef. No complaints came to the Board from the Medical Superintendent about food or about the cold. He knew nothing of the cold except on a visit one morning. None of the attendants told him of the cold. During the winter instructions should be given to keep up fires longer.

To Dr. Conroy—The board visited in turns. It was considered that a monthly visit should be sufficient provided proper management existed. Though he ought to have visited oftener than he did.

To Mr. Rogers—The attendants are not educated properly to look after patients. Should be lectured by medical superintendent. The male attendants are generally good, and same females. The wages is not satisfactory.

Dr. Blanchard to Mr. Rogers—Wages are fixed. The attendants are the best to be procured for the wages given

Dr. Blanchard has read a memorandum of his visits to the asylum. From June 1st, 1898 to Dec. 31st, 1898, 183 days, he had made 185 visits. From January 1st, 1899 to Sept. 31st, 234 days without Sundays, 245 visits were made. He was not supposed to visit on Sundays, but often did. Dr. Blanchard also read a portion of his report to the Government for 1891.

To Mr. McEachern—When a patient is sick the attendance on him is increased. A patient's pulse and temperature is not taken by attendants owing to incompetence. When death occurs immediate notification is always given.

The subpoenaing of new witnesses was discussed and deemed unnecessary.

The taking of evidence here closed.

Mr. Farquharson said he made reference the other day to something that appeared in the press of this city, and thought at the time that the press was very unfair. The press is still following it up and is prejudicing the public and the commission. His name was used in respect to "fixing" the report of the commissioner. He would like to have the commissioners' opinion on this matter, and to express their strong disapproval of this action. The statements have been greatly exaggerated and calculated to do this province harm.

The investigation has proven the statements which appeared to be almost completely false. The reason he referred to this, he said, was that the commissioners in their closing report may express their opinion on the action of the press of this town on the whole situation.

The commission followed criticising the course the press had taken. A desire to find out facts had been the motive of the investigation. If the press keeps within the law nothing could be said. Policies would never enter into their consideration. Dr. Conroy said that if anything can be corrected Mr. Farquharson would be the more pleased that it had been found out. Nothing ought to prejudice the people or commission. Common fair play should dictate a different course than the press has followed. It was a reflection on the Premier and on the commission, and an insinuation against their fairness and honesty. If the report of the commissioner was found to be different from the evidence then was the time for the press to criticise.

The commissioners met last night and prepared their preliminary report which has been sent to the Governor.

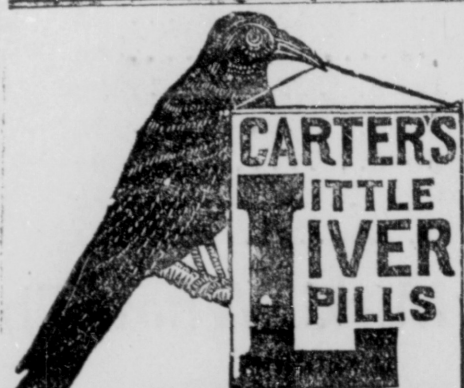
