Gulf Shore Road To Be Repaved

The Gulf Shore Road between Brackley and Dalvey is to receive a three-inch coating of bituminous concrete according to an announcement made from the department of public works in Ottawa yesterday.

This road constructed in 1936 with a 36-foot wide top was in the nature of an experiment in that the pavement was laid on top of sand.

Last summer during the heavy tourist traffic it began to show signs of deterioration and engineers are hopeful that the new 3-inch coating will save it.

A contract for \$33,720 has been awarded to Curran and Briggs of Toronto and Summerside. The paving is expected to start early next summer, an official of the public works department said.

The Brackley to Dalvey highway built along the north shore of the National Park is one of the most scenic in the province. It formed part of the route taken by Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip when they visited the island last July.

Supervising engineer for the department is H. A. Nason, Charlottetown.

Grand Jury Returns Bills, Urges Improved Facilities

The members of the grand jury found true bills in each of two indictments which came before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell as the fall session of the Supreme Court opened here yesterday morning.

The two indictments before the court were that of Donald Joseph Gallant Summerside charged with having unlawful possession of goods obtained by crime and that of Alfred Daniel Cahill and Albert Clair Gallant charged with robbery with violence.

Crown Prosecutor George MacMahon and Attorney-General R. R. Bell, QC, are appearing for the Queen in both cases while Alex Campbell is representing Donald Joseph Gallant and is acting with J.O.C. Campbell, QC, in representing the defendants Albert Gallant and Alfred Cahill.

Donald Joseph Gallant will be tried before the court this morning and at that time a date will be set in regard to the trial of the other two accused.

In the report of the Prince County Sheriff, Robert Dewar, presented yesterday morning it was noted that 88 prisoners at one time or another had been imprisoned in the jail and that 12 of these are still serving sentences.

OFFENCES LISTED
Of the total number 88 were serving sentences for contraventions under the Temperance Act; six for care and control; one for reckless driving; two for the theft of a motor vehicle; one under the Excise Act; one for illegal possession of liquor; two for break and entry; one for theft; and the remainder for other minor offences.

In addressing the grand jury, Chief Justice Campbell said there is no greater deterrent of serious crime than the vigilance of the law in prosecuting those who are guilty of minor offences.

In their report following their inspection of the court house and adjoining jail, the grand jury noted that the various offices in the court house are in reasonably good condition but recommended the redecoration of a few offices especially the one occupied by the deputy prothonotary.

They also found that the law library where the legal reference books are maintained was badly overcrowded and poorly lighted and suggested that alterations or recommendations that may be made by the library committee.

of the bar association be carried out.

The members of the jury also noted that the fire escape leading from the jailor's living quarters being of vertical wooden construction was most inadequate and recommended that it be replaced by a properly approved fire escape.

BETTER FACILITIES NEEDED
The Prince County jail was found to be well maintained, but the jury saw need for more suitable facilities for the laundering of the prisoners' clothing.

The jury also found that the enforcement of law through the municipal and Royal Canadian Mounted Police was well in hand but were concerned with the danger to the public in a number of instances when the police were in

pursuit of an offending motorist.

They recommended that more discretion be given by the police in judging the danger to others when travelling at such a fast rate of speed.

4 Shanties Destroyed Near Mount Stewart

MOUNT STEWART— Fire early yesterday morning destroyed four fishing shanties at Savage Harbor on the coast about five miles from here. A large quantity of rope and a boat engine were also consumed in the blaze which was first noticed by one of the nearby farmers.

Several other shanties and hundreds of lobster traps and several boats were saved by the efforts of a volunteer group that quickly gathered. Loss was estimated at close to \$10,000.

The sleeping houses, all unoccupied at the time of the outbreak were in use during the fishing season only. Owners were Harold Douglas, West St. Peter's the Savage Harbor Packing Company, and Luther Coffin, Desmond Doyle and Joseph MacKay, all of Mount Stewart.

Members of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP are understood to be investigating the occurrence.

Revival Services Commence At Tryon Baptist Church

TRYON — The first in a series of evangelistic services was held in the Tryon Baptist Church Tuesday, November 17, with Rev. Keith Hobson of Summerside Baptist Church as missionary.

Mr. Hobson took as his theme "Hounded by Love" in which he depicted God's relentless search for man.

First of all, the speaker referred to the probing and searching by God for all that is valuable in human life. "This probing is marked," he said, "both by the suffering of man as he looks upon his sins, and the sacrifice by God who gave His Son."

Secondly, the speaker declared that inmost thoughts, though hidden from our fellow-men are known to God. Quoting the words of the psalmist, Mr. Hobson said "Thou understandest my thoughts afar off."

Again, the speaker declared that man could try to live on his own resources, but without success. "In life's extreme experiences a man's resources fail and he is thrown back on God," he said.

Finally, he declared that though man may try to escape from God in every conceivable way, he is unable to do so.

Quoting from Francis Thompson's poem "The Hound of Heaven" he depicted God as pursuing His children relentlessly across the years.

The choir, under the direction of Mrs. Lloyd Rogerson sang "The Ninety-Nine" and "Give Me Thy Heart."

The service was conducted by the pastor of the church, Rev. L.R. Graves, assisted by Rev. A.D.C. Earle.
