**TEACHERS ASSOCIATION**—At a meeting of the Executive of the Provincial Teachers' Association held in Charlottetown on the 11th inst, arrangements were completed for the holding of the Teacher's Convention on the 6th and 7th of Oct. next. In reference to the change recently made in the Public Schools' Act the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved—That in repealing the supplementary clause and thus withdrawing the strong inducement which that clause has held out to school districts to vote supplements to their teachers, the Legislature has destroyed a very important principle of the Public Schools' Act and has so mutilated that act as to seriously impair its efficiency; and further, that in striking off so large an amount from the already exceptionally small salaries of the teachers, not only without making any provision whereby the deficiency may be made good, but in such a manner as to insure a still further reduction on the part of the school districts, the Legislature has not only shirked its responsibility and done the teachers an injustice, but has inflicted a lasting injury upon the educational interests of this province.

SUMMERSIDE, June 15.

The Supreme Court closed its session at Summerside yesterday, and Chief Justice Sullivan, Attorney-General Macdonald and the other lawyers in attendance returned to the city last evening.

Harry Richards.—Indictment for house-breaking and larceny. Three years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

James Morrell.—Indictment for arson, six years in penitentiary.

James Colhat.—Same charge. Six years in penitentiary.

John Gallant.—Indictment for attempt at rape and indecent assault. Prisoner pleaded guilty to an indecent assault. Two years in the penitentiary with a whipping.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Yesterday, while Mr. John Jeffrey, of Georgetown, was returning from the fishing grounds, in company with his two sons, Edward and Robert, a squall came up and their boat was snuk in Sturgeon Bay. Edward was a good swimmer and succeeded in getting his brother to the spar which remained above water. Then turning about to save his father Edward was horrified to see his apparently lifeless body some distance away floating face downward. A few minutes later it disappeared from sight. Edward then made his way back to the spar where his brother was, and there the two remained until they were rescued by Mr. Richard Thornton, of Sturgeon, an hour and a half later. Mr Jeffrey's body has been recovered. He was 66 years of age, and a native of Portsmouth, England. A wife and three sons are left to mourn.

FIRE EXTINGUISHING TEST.—Says the Halifax Recorder: "Fully 1000 people were present last evening at a quarter to 3, on the Market Square, to witness a highly successful test of the Sempel Fire extinguisher, under very unfavorable circumstances, a heavy North East wind was blowing against the stream of the extinguisher. A building 10x12, and 8ft high, was erected in the Market Square. It was built of dry pine and filled with inflammable material, then saturated with coal oil. The fire was started at 7.45, and in less than 10 seconds it was under control, and completely out in 25 seconds, a single 3 gallon Sempel being used. It was the opinion of all present that it was the best exhibition of such a test ever given in Halifax." Mr. Geo. J. Rogers, sole agent for P E Island, will give an exhibition on the Market Square this evening at 9 o'clock, under the superintendence of Mr. Large, chief of the fire department. The exhibition will be well worth seeing.
