Service Parade Held At Tignish

On Remembrance Day yesterday at Tignish veterans, members of the Canadian Legion, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides attended church services at 9 o'clock, conducted by Rev. J. A. McDonald, parish priest. Following church services the parade proceeded to the War Memorial for the laying of wreaths. The two minutes silence was solemnly observed at the Canadian Legion Home at 11 o'clock. In the afternoon members of the Legion and their guests attended a banquet in the Legion Home which was catered by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Legion. J. Hector Buote, ably conducted the ceremonies and opened proceedings with a toast to "The Queen". Guest speakers were Earl Cannon of Summerside, who spoke on the aims and objects of the Legion, Rev. Father McDonald, Rev. P. C. Walsh, C. F. Morrissey a senior citizen of Tignish and Dr. S. Bubbican who responded to the toast to the ladies. Several other prominent citizens spoke briefly. In the evening a very successful dance was held in the Legion dance hall with the music being provided by Noonan's orchestra.

Queens Member Is Guest Speaker At S'side Dinner

Mr. Angus MacLean, D. F. G., M.P. for Queens was the guest speaker last evening at the annual Remembrance Day banquet of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L. Mr. MacLean said in his opening remarks that his talk might be "Comments on being a good veteran" and in his address he outlined the duties and responsibilities of the men who are today the veterans of two world wars. He said that "as veterans we are in a privileged position. We have advantages that do not come to non-veterans. These advantages carry with them certain obligations. We have the responsibility of seeing that our community is as good as we can possibly make. We have an obligation to our friends and comrades who did not survive the war to keep their memory green. Because we are veterans we cannot be lax in the things that are expected of us." Mr. MacLean said that as veterans "we can recall with pleasure and also with grief those days when Western civilization was fighting with its back against the wall" and he made fitting reference to the women in the services who shared in the things veterans remember most and enjoy - the friendships made during those war years. "as veterans," he went on, "we have a powerful voice in the affairs of our country and the veterans of World War Two are now at an age when they can become leaders in the community, an example which the veterans of World War One set for them."

Services Held At Alberton War Monument Yesterday

On Remembrance Day at Alberton a parade comprised of veterans of two world wars, members of the Alberton detachment of the R.C.M. Services at the monument began with the singing of "O Canada" followed by an address and prayer by Rev. Murray Gardner, minister of the Alberton United Church, the hymn "O Valiant Hearts" by Bugler Angus Milligan, with lowering of the colors, two minutes silence, and concluded with the singing of "The Queen". The singing was led by members of the Alberton United Church Men's Choir. During the ceremony Scouts Allan Johnston and Clifford Gavin with staffs stood on opposite sides of the monument. Wreaths were placed for the Provincial Government by Mr. Fred Ramsay, M.L.A.; town of Alberton by Mayor H. E. Barbour; the Legion by Alberton Branch president John Rochford; motherhood of Canada by Mrs. Eliza Skerry; Boy Scouts by Dean Carpenter; Summerside Lions Club by Ross LeFurgey; Wolf Cubs by Grant Noonan; B. and M. Supermarket by Angus Milligan. Others laying wreaths were Steven Murphy, Kenneth Quigley, Arthur Ramsay. In the afternoon veterans and their guests assembled at the Hillside restaurant for a banquet presided over by Comrade Harbert Leavitt. Following grace by Rev. Mr. Gardner, the chairman extended a sincere welcome to Mayor Barbour, the R.C.M.P., Rev. Mr. Gardner, and Pte. Kenneth Millman, P.P.C.L.I., who is presently on leave at his home in Alberton. During the dinner violin selections by Tommy Phillips were greatly enjoyed. The toast to the Queen was proposed by the chairman. Toast to the fallen, proposed by John C. Matthews, responded to by Rev. Murray Gardner. Toast to the armed forces proposed by Comrade Donald Moore, on behalf of the Alberton Legion president, responded to by R. D. McKinnon. Comrade Ivan Nicholson addressed the gathering briefly. Following a vote of thanks to the management and staff of the restaurant for the delicious turkey dinner the proceedings came to a close with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne".
