

# Millionaires In 7-2 Win Over Islanders

## Moncton Hawks Score 6-5 Overtime Victory Over Saint John Beavers

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 29.—(CP)—Moncton Hawks outscored and outlucked Saint John Beavers 6-5 in an overtime Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight. Down 2-0 at the end of the first period, Hawks shot four tallies in the second session to Beavers two, ended the third period with the score deadlocked at 5-all and went on to score the winning tally at 3:08 of the overtime play. Marcel Bessette rapped in the winner on a neat passing play with Gordie Miller and Mousie Dowling, after catching the Beavers deep in Moncton territory on a gangling attack.

Other Moncton marksmen were Miller, Sandy Ayr, and Dowling. Dowling and Bessette each scored a pair to share scoring honors with Buck Whitlock who netted two for Beavers. Other Beaver scorers were Heon, Brennan and Platz.

Lady Luck smiled on both teams but saved her most palooking play for Hawks. Tommy Brennan was credited with the third Beaver goal when Big Lorne Smith, Hawk defenceman, cleared the puck into his own net.

In the third, with six minutes of play remaining, Dowling got credited for the tying goal when a Beaver forward and goalie Dennis Brodeur deflected the puck into their own cage in attempting to clear.

Hawks played with only two regular defencemen. Gus Gallipeau rangy rearguard was kept out of action by a leg injury picked up in Halifax Saturday night. Bessette alternated between the forward line and the rearguard to relieve the two regular defencemen.

The game was ragged in the first period, but tightened up in the middle frame when Hawks began clicking on passing plays and rapped in four tallies. Hawks again applied the pressure in the final, hammering 13 shots at Brodeur while Colvin handled four. Hawks outshot their rivals 25-21.

It will be an entirely new team for Island fans to see in action for the first time this season, and will provide yet another instance for them to see how the Lamoureux-coached squad compares with clubs from the Cape Breton circuit.

They have seen them strut their stuff against the league leading

Millionaires, and now they will have the opportunity of seeing them stack up against the next big contender in the C.B.S.H.L., the Miners, who of late have been more than demonstrating their prowess even against the front-running Moneymen.

It should be a wide-open contest that will provide plenty of action for the cash customers, with former Islanders player, husky rearguard Bob Gray performing back on the Miners blue-line corps.

## Attendance Falls Off At Chicago Hockey Games

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The reeling Chicago Black Hawks, who on Thursday night can set a National Hockey League record of 22 straight games without victory, also are getting clipped where it hurts most—at the gate.

Once the darlings of the Chicago Stadium set—win or lose—the Hawks are running almost 70,000 paid admissions behind last year when they also monopolized the league cellar.

Winless since a 3-2 victory at Toronto Dec. 6 and at home since a 5-0 verdict over Detroit Nov. 26, the injured-riddled Hawks have attracted 254,275 fans to 23 Chicago Stadium games. Last year for the first 23 home games, attendance was 323,756.

With 12 home games remaining, the Hawks conceivably could fall approximately 100,000 below last year's home total attendance of 478,417.

Such a situation tends to foster a falling off of attendance, which can be a trend that will jeopardize the best of leagues and put the various clubs in financial difficulties through no apparent fault of their own. Such has been one of the big reasons for past talks in connection with "almagamation" and "interlocking" schedules between the two major hockey loops in the Maritimes—a thing that will no doubt become a reality in the not too distant future—possibly as soon as next season when Maritime enthusiasts might even be witnessing a six-team league, or even larger, embracing entries from both circuits as one major loop in the Maritimes.

The Rangers, however, had four ties in their winless string from Jan. 23 to the end of the season. The Hawks have three ties in their unprofitable skid. The Black Hawks' current losing streak of eight is still far behind the league record of 15, set by the defunct Philadelphia Quakers, Nov. 30, 1930, to Jan. 10, 1931.

Unless the Hawks find the winning combination that so long has been eluding harassed coach Eddie Goodfellow, Boston Bruins Thursday night will have the privilege of handing the battered Chicagoans the league's longest, winless string of 22 games.

Goodfellow, who finds it hard to live up to his name, has estimated that injuries have kept various Hawks out of a total of 150 games.

A crushing blow was the permanent loss of Jack Stewart, one of the toughest defencemen in the circuit. A back injury may have ended Stewart's career.

Young Dee Lefurgy, son of a former great Summerside goaler, and spare goale for the S. & M. boys, was put between the pipes because the regular custodian, "Unk" Rogers, was not available, and Dee proceeded to show the fans that the name of Lefurgy is still to be reckoned with when it comes to stopping the whizzing black hail of rubber. The youngster, facing his first intermediate team, was cool and steady, and made a lot of fine saves.

Now a word of commendation for the defeated team. The Crystals went into that game with instructions from their manager and their coach to go easy on the rough stuff when playing the kids, and they carried out those instructions to the letter. With the score piling up against them, the temptation to push the kids around would naturally be strong, but not even in the final period did the Crystals show any disposition to play it rough. The match was cleanly played on both sides with only a few penalties for minor infractions.

This surprising win on the part of our juniors will no doubt mean a larger crowd on Thursday evening when the Sackville Juniors visit Crystal Rink to take on the Sheen & McInnis sextet. The fans will now realize that they can see just as good hockey by watching those teen-agers as they can by looking at the intermediates in action.

The low score, 41-30, in the basketball game between the R.C.A.F. and St. Dunstan's Friday evening, was the result not so much of tight defensive play as it was of sloppy, inaccurate shooting. We don't remember having seen worse sniping on the airforce court. Even easy lay-up shots were muffed.

The Summerside High School girls' basketball team are having tough luck with their playing dates. Twice now, their opponents failed to show up because of unfavorable weather conditions. Rumor has it the Students' Council of the High School offered them free passes to the dance if they won the game. Huh-huh-huh! Have you heard that other one about the Scotch millionaire who offered \$25,000 to any swimmer who would swim the Atlantic ocean?

All kidding aside, the girls have high hopes of better results this year. They have new additions to their team and a new coach in the person of Paul Serheniuk. The girls speak highly of him. Whether that means that he is a competent coach, or just that he has a nice smile, we wouldn't know.

We've had one of those upsets in Summerside.

The Sheen & McInnis Juniors, organized in the face of steady opposition by sports leaders and followers, starting off the season with a disastrous 12-1 trouncing from the Charlottetown Juniors, played with players dropping out of the roster for one reason or another, lined up in Crystal Rink Saturday night and gave the intermediate Crystals the worst drubbing they have received since the S. D. U. boys plastered a lop-sided score on them two years ago in Charlottetown.

Only Bucko Trainer seemed able to get through the tight Sydney defence.

Cliff Roach made it 4-0, sticking handling prettily around Phil Vitale, after trapping Bowness' flip pass.

## Sydney Evens Exhibition Series With Ch'town In New Glasgow Game

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., Jan. 29.—(CP)—Sydney Millionaires played a methodical, unruffled game tonight against Charlottetown Islanders to even the score between the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League and the Maritime Senior circuit.

The Moneymen slugged Islanders 7-2 on neutral ice in this Pictou County game in their fifth exhibition game. They tied one, and each team now has won two. Sydney is leader of the Cape Breton circuit and Islanders have the drop on Maritime major teams.

Islanders attempted from the first to overpower the Maritime champions. In the opening 30 seconds, Dutchak and MacIntyre went to the ice, trading punches. Both drew minors. A minute later, Danny Horeck smashed Red McRae into the boards. Islanders were playing a very aggressive style and it was only with the greatest difficulty that coach Bill Dinning restrained Millionaires from retaliating.

Midway through the period, as the cool, methodical play of the Sydney club began to make itself felt, the Charlottetown pace slackened. Then Millionaires began to sit through, on three-man attacks.

Gordon blocked five close-in shots before Millionaires broke through for their first goal. Matthews, carrying through centre, flipped the puck across to Cliff Roach, after whipping around the defence. When Sydney native slipped the puck over to Bob Bowness, parked at the side of the cage, Gordon was well out of his cage on the shot. Hildebrand scored the second goal little more than a minute later. Birukow carried down the wing and when one of the defencemen went for him, centred across to Hildebrand. Coasting in and screened by a couple of milling Islanders, Hildebrand snapped the puck into the open corner, a target of little more than four inches.
