Robert Doull, broker, of the St. Lawrence marine insurance association, in consequence of the closing of the St. Lawrence association and its not being in a position to pay his claim of some \$20,000, assigned this claim to the Pictou bank to meet certain liabilities incurred on account of said association, and this was the only ground for such rumor.—Halifax Herald.

MACKEREL ON THE NOVA SCOTIA COAST.—A CARBO correspondent writes:—"Numerous small catches of mackerel have been made in this neighborhood, among the larger ones 100 barrels last week, and 50 barrels this week in Messrs. Roberts' trap, Whitehead, and 50 barrels in Enos Goodwin's trap, Whitehead, a few days ago. The mackerel are large No. 3's, fair for the season, worth, I believe, \$9 per barrel in Boston. A fleet of fishermen, including a number of American purse seiners, are off here, and frequently run in when the fog shuts down. The only catch I have heard of their making yet is 250 barrels caught off Cape Sable, by the schooner Commodore Fote. It is stated that more vessels are engaged in this branch of fishing this year than for some time past."—Halifax Chronicle.

KING DODDS, well known throughout Canada as an anti-prohibitionist orator, recently challenged Neal Dow, the celebrated temperance advocate, to a public discussion of the liquor question. Mr. Dow declined the honor in a letter, an extract from which we publish:—"I am told there is a fellow in Canada who is in the pay of men living by this devilish trade, who wants with me a public discussion as to the 'legitimacy' of the liquor traffic and its claim to 'protection and respect, and as to the rightfulness and propriety of the policy of suppressing it by law.' When bank-robbers, burglars, incendiaries, train-wreckers, cut-throats, fratricides, homicides, slave-traders, traitors employ an agent to talk up their less harmful way of life, and when such an agent shall be met upon the rostrum by any man with a particle of self-respect, it will be time enough for me to recognize a paid agent of the 'gigantic crime of crimes' by admitting for a moment that it is possible for society to hold any other relation to the liquor traffic than that of the things of India to be heard in justification of their profession and the demand for recognition as a 'legitimate' way of life and for 'protection and respect' would be no more impudent than the demand of the liquor trade for 'protection and law'."

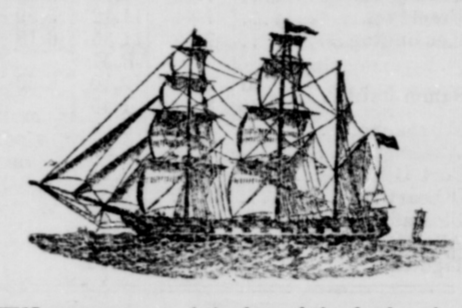

IN pursuance of an act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled: "An Act to amend the Act of the eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same'."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
