THE new *Gulfair* will sail from this port on Friday morning, to commence the Government survey on Labrador.

THE steamer *Mironichi* arrived from Montreal this forenoon with a full cargo, consisting of flour and general merchandise.

A FISHERMAN, named John Leith, was drowned by the upsetting of a boat while fishing off Red Point—four miles from Souris East—this forenoon.

THE REV. G. W. HOPKINSON and Mr. W. C. HARRIS arrived home last evening. They have been attending the Episcopal Synod at Halifax during the past week.

THE steamer *M. A. Starr* arrived from Halifax early this morning, with a full cargo of general merchandise. She was delayed at Port Hawkesbury for repairs.

A GENERAL MEETING of the electors of Prince County will be held in Summerside this evening. Several gentlemen left this city in the 11.35 a. m. train to be present.

BUSINESS is quite lively about the wharves to-day. The arrival of three steamers last night with full cargoes afforded employment to the large number who have been idle for a few days past.

THE brig *Harry Blackwood*, English, Master, owned by Messrs. Longworth & Co., will sail for Queenstown for orders to-morrow, with a cargo of 17,500 bushels oats and 300 pieces deals.

WE were yesterday shown an elegantly finished and handsome modeled whaleboat, built by Mr. Philip's for the new *Gulfair*. It is one of the best ever built in this city, and reflects much credit on the builder.

AT 8 o'clock last evening an affray occurred on Water street between the Captain and Mate of an English trading barkentine. Round No. 3 resulted in the exit of the Captain, with a bleeding face and one eye totally closed and colored.

DEATH OF EX GOVERNOR WILMOT.—EX changes received last evening announced the sudden death of the Hon. E. A. Wilmot, at Fredericton, yesterday afternoon. Mr. Wilmot it seems was in his usual health during the day and in the afternoon, as was his custom, worked for some time in his garden. On returning to the house he dropped suddenly to the floor, dying almost immediately, it is said. Heart disease, from which it is said he had been suffering for some time, is supposed to have been the cause.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.—The S. S. *Albert*, with mails and passengers, arrived at Pictou on the 18th inst., and reports: The herring fishery here is a failure. A number of the fleet which arrived here for this fishery have proceeded on to Anticosti and Labrador, in search of fish, and others have returned home empty. Our sealing fleet have all returned with good fares. The barque *Magnolia*, before reported ashore near Shag Island, has been condemned, and will be stripped and sold for the benefit of whom it may concern.

A MEETING of the City Council was held last evening for the purpose of passing a number of newly codified by-laws and transacting sundry business. With the exception of the senior Councillor for Ward 4, all Councillors and the Recorder were present. The legality of the appointment of the City Assessors was questioned by the Mayor, and to "make assurance doubly sure," they were, on motion, re-appointed in the same order as the previous appointments. A number of newly codified by-laws were then read and passed. The by-law relating to horses and carriages for the purpose of taxation, evoked considerable discussion. Councillor Stumbles opposed it, and gave notice that at next meeting he would bring in a resolution for its repeal. The by-law was supported by Councillor Byrne, who could see no good reason why horses and carriages should not be taxed as well as other property. It was read clause by clause and lost on a division of five to four. The Committee on Tenders reported in favor of the tenders of Messrs. Houston, McDougall and Seaman for the construction of a sample water cart, and a motion was carried their tender be accepted. Mr. James Houston was awarded the contract for keeping the street lamps in repair after which the Council adjourned.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 21. Five thousand refugees assembled to-day and sent a delegation to the Porte asking relief and declaring that their provisions had failed and that sickness was increasing among them. The Porte promised that their rations henceforth would be regularly distributed.

An official despatch to the Turkish Representatives abroad, thus described events yesterday: "About thirty refugees entered the gardens of the palace inhabited by Ex-Sultan Murad, and raised shouts of long live the Sultan."

Sentries opposed the entry of these men, and were fired upon; one being killed. The troops arriving, the assailants were driven back. Some were killed and wounded on both sides.

All Suavi, who appeared to have acted as organizer and leader of the attack, was killed; the affair had no other consequence—public tranquillity was undisturbed.

LONDON, May 21. In the Commons this afternoon Mr. Gourley made an inquiry as to what information the Government had received relative to the reported outfitting of Russian cruisers in American waters.

The Attorney General said that persons who were stated to be acting for the Russian Government had recently purchased steamships in America; but the British Government had no reason to believe these vessels were intended, in the event of war between England and Russia, to be commissioned or employed as privateers in contravention of the Treaty of Paris.

NEW YORK, May 21. A cable special to the *Telegraph* says that the British Admiralty are making extensive arrangements for the purpose of opposing Russia's scheme of establishing a fleet of cruisers to prey upon British commerce.

General News.

OTTAWA, May 20. The Aide-de Camp of the Governor-General was presented with a handsome silver service, valued at \$750, by a number of friends.

Private dispatches from the North-West point to trouble with Sitting Bull. It is now almost certain that the Provincial Exhibition will be held here, the opposition to the bye-law appropriating \$50,000 being removed.

MONTREAL, May 20. Two accidents occurred on board ship to-day, one fatal, and another likely to prove so. Mrs. Field, wife of a leading photographer, was seriously burned to-day by the ignition of varnish plates.

Lady Dufferin has arrived, and Lord Dufferin is expected to-morrow. Both will probably participate in the grand military demonstration on the Queen's Birthday.

QUEBEC, May 20. The grand opening of the Roman Catholic Provincial Council of Bishops took place to-day. Dr. Conroy has arrived and is in attendance.

A new Catholic Bishopric has been created for Chicoutimi; the Abbe Racine, first Bishop.

TORONTO, May 20. Lord Dufferin formally opened the Exhibition of the Ontario Society of Artists to-day.

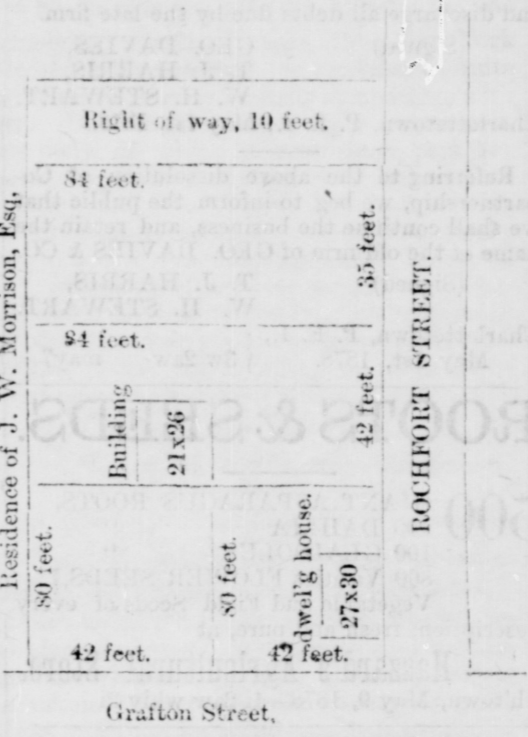
