Accidents Take 14 Lives In Atlantic Provinces

 Fourteen persons died accidentally in the Atlantic provinces during the weekend. Drownings took ten lives and four died in traffic accidents. In Newfoundland, 18-year-old Roy Saunders of Windsor died while swimming at a park about nine miles from his home in the province's central region. On Saturday Gordon Ivay, also of Windsor, drowned in a traffic accident near his St. John's home. In Nova Scotia, 11-year-old Stella Davidson and her seven-year-old sister Sharon drowned Saturday in a swimming hole near their Guysborough County home. Fifteen-year-old Louise Sawlar of Berwick, N.S., drowned Sunday in Lake Paul 23 miles from Kentville in the Annapolis Valley. Donald Coady, 22, died Friday near his home in Inverness when his car left the road and overturned. Les Lang, 78-year-old former hockey player and coach, drowned Sunday in Gasperova Lake in the Annapolis Valley. He apparently suffered a heart attack while swimming.

MYSTERIOUS RAINMAKER HAS IMPRESSIVE RECORD

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—The flood-producing downpour that fell here Saturday washed away any doubts Tulsa's mysterious rainmaker had about his method. He announced Sunday he is turning professional and will make it rain anywhere on what he called a no rain, no money basis. The announcement came from behind the cloud he has kept in front of his name ever since he took up rainmaking. "I feel reasonably sure I have it down pat," he said. And, despite scoffing from the U.S. Weather Bureau and other meteorologists, he has reason for confidence. He predicted Thursday that rain would fall before 4 p.m. Sunday. And did it ever. Nearly nine inches of rain set a record here and swamped the city.

Agreement Is Reached At Ottawa Conference

The federal government has agreed to drop the restrictions that originally confined the \$400,000 to the purchase of municipal debentures for bonds, sewer and water systems, and a few buildings. Hospitals, schools, old age homes and similar projects already qualifying for federal grants can be financed under the fund and it was left to each province to decide how the money is to be allocated.

Ottawa Widens Scope Of Bill

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has widened the scope and modified the formula for its \$400,000,000 municipal loan fund Saturday to win far-reaching agreement at the first federal-provincial conference over which Prime Minister Pearson presided. There were smiles and praise all round when the premiers of eight provinces and representatives of two others—Alberta and the British Columbia—departed from the two-day meeting, called to discuss federal government plans for the municipal loans and a system of contributory retirement pensions. Technical discussions were held on the pensions program, but it was decided more meetings would be necessary. These probably will be held in November.

Rescued Couple Tell Of Horror

SKOPJE, Yugoslavia (AP)—A Belgian and his wife, Doug Macdonald Monday 56 hours after Skopje's killed earthquake entombed them, said they were about abandoned hope and had ready to commit suicide. "If we were not rescued in a few hours, Serge and I were going to cut our wrists and die together," said Suzanne Jacquemart, 52, as she told from her hospital bed a story of horror and maddening thirst. Her 35-year-old biologist husband, Serge, lay beside her recovering from shock and bruises. Mrs. Jacquemart's injuries were minor. Doctors and rescue workers said it was a "miracle" that anyone could have survived in the hotel. Officials estimated that nearly 300 guests were in the popular tourist hotel when the

MPs, Senators, Judges Slated For Pay Boost

 OTTAWA (CP)—Pay raises have been proposed for Canada's parliamentarians and judiciary following a round of salary hikes for the federal civil service and the armed forces. The government made the first move Saturday in giving orders to two resolutions to be taken up by the House of Commons today. One deals with parliamentary indemnities and expense allowances; the other with judge's salaries and the creation of new judgeships. No amounts were stipulated in the formal resolution. A political source, however, said the basis pay of an MP will be raised to \$18,000 a year from \$10,000. The new rate will include a \$6,000 tax-free expense allowance in place of the \$2,000 tax free allowance now paid.

LEADERS GET RAISE

Cabinet ministers, whose total income now is \$27,000 a year will receive an increase as will Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, who is paid the same as a cabinet minister. Prime Minister Pearson's total income of \$37,000 for which he pays \$5,000 for the use of his residences, 24 Sussex Street and Harring

Frequent New Tremors Spark Fear In Skopje

 SKOPJE, Yugoslavia—New tremors sent waves of fear across quake-wrecked Skopje Sunday as the number of known dead in the disaster which struck this ancient Macedonian city last Friday pushed past the 700 mark. The latest tremors, described as "rather violent," did not cause fresh damage to the 80 per cent-destroyed city but it did speed evacuation of nearly all civilians. Meanwhile, rescue workers found several Yugoslav and foreign tourists alive in the debris and dug into the ruins with renewed energy. One rescue operation took place at the Hotel Macedonia. A Yugoslav and a Belgian couple were dug out alive, but officials feared the demolished hotel, a modern, four-story stone building, may be the tomb for nearly 300 other persons. FEAR EPIDEMIC

As rescue workers pushed forward with their work, the smell of death lay heavily over the wasted city. Officials said the team had recovered five bodies buried in cemeteries outside the city to help in rescue work. Fresh civilian rescue groups from throughout the country poured in to help weary workers who have been toiling almost without rest since Thursday.

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
