Island Breeders Enlarge Stocks

A shipment of livestock and poultry from Ontario arrived in Charlottetown late Tuesday. It contained a half dozen registered Holstein cattle for Lewis Brothers, York; a registered Holstein steer for Eric Laird and Sons, North Milton; sheep for Athol Roberts, Southport; Allison Stewart and Lincoln Boswell, Dunstaffnage; an Ayrshire bull for Keith Boswell and Son, Victoria; and a few geese and ducks. They made a strange combination, observed Parker Newson, Kingston who came in the car with the livestock and poultry. The Lewis Brothers' cattle included five young cows in milk and one heifer calf. Two of the animals were two-year-old heifers in milk, the other three were heifers or very young cows, Mr. Newson said late yesterday afternoon. Mr. Roberts bought three Suffolk sheep which he purchased from the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, Ontario. Mr. Roberts has approximately 140 breeding ewes in all, he told the Guardian. Mr. Stewart bought one Suffolk Cheviot ram, and a Leicester ram lamb and one ewe lamb. Mr. Boswell bought one Border Cheviot ram. The Lewis Brothers' cattle were purchased from the Penvalle dispersal sale at Glasgow, near London, Ontario. **BIG PRICE PAID** Several of the animals are exceptionally well bred, Mr. Newson said, one of them is sired by a bull that sold from the Rosale herd — it has since been dispersed for \$30,000, perhaps 10 years ago. The three Maritime ministers of agriculture at the time — Eugene Cullen was Island minister — went as high as \$20,000 on this bull at the time. Their purpose was to place him in an artificial insemination unit where his semen would be available to Maritime breeders. His calves have been really good, Mr. Newson told the Guardian. The bull purchased for the Boswell Ayrshire herd at Victoria is from the Ellen Bomoass herd at Bell's Corner, Quebec. Mr. Palmer was not available for comment last night, but the Guernsey heifer he purchased was sold at the Sale of Stars at the Royal Winter Fair for \$475. Mr. Newson sold a bull that is a junior calf for \$700 at a national sale at the Hays Brothers sale arena at Oakville, Ontario.

Kingston Cow Nominated As All-Canadian

Diamond Hill Dean has been nominated for All-Canadian consideration in the Holstein breed, it was learned last evening from Parker Newson, Kingston—the farm is listed as Oswald Newson and Son. Only six animals in Canada are selected for each classification, so the nomination confers automatically a marked honor on the animal selected, and on the men who bred him. The Diamond Hill herd has had two animals nominated for All-Canadian consideration in previous years. One of them, Nita Blackford Duke, was nominated as a yearling heifer. A junior calf from the Diamond Hill herd — his name is Rocket — and he was born last January — sold for \$700 last week at a national sale in the Hays Brothers' ring, just outside Toronto. The youngster was purchased by Hays Brothers who will probably export him to one of the top markets for the Black-and-White breed. There's a lot of breeding and top production behind the two bulls whose dams are maternal sisters. There are three generations of "Very Good" cows behind them and this is next to the highest classification for confirmation. Their grand and great grand dams were two-star brood cows and two of them, Diamond Hill Vimy and Diamond Hill Echo were Blue Seal and Red Seal producers. The Blue Seal is the highest classification as it indicates 125,000 pounds of milk. The Red Seal indicates 100,000 pounds.

Island Farmers Said Big Users

Figures released yesterday by the Atlantic Regional Office of the National Employment Service show that P.E.I. farmers made greater use of the two employment offices on the Island than their counterparts in the other three Atlantic Provinces made of their local offices. 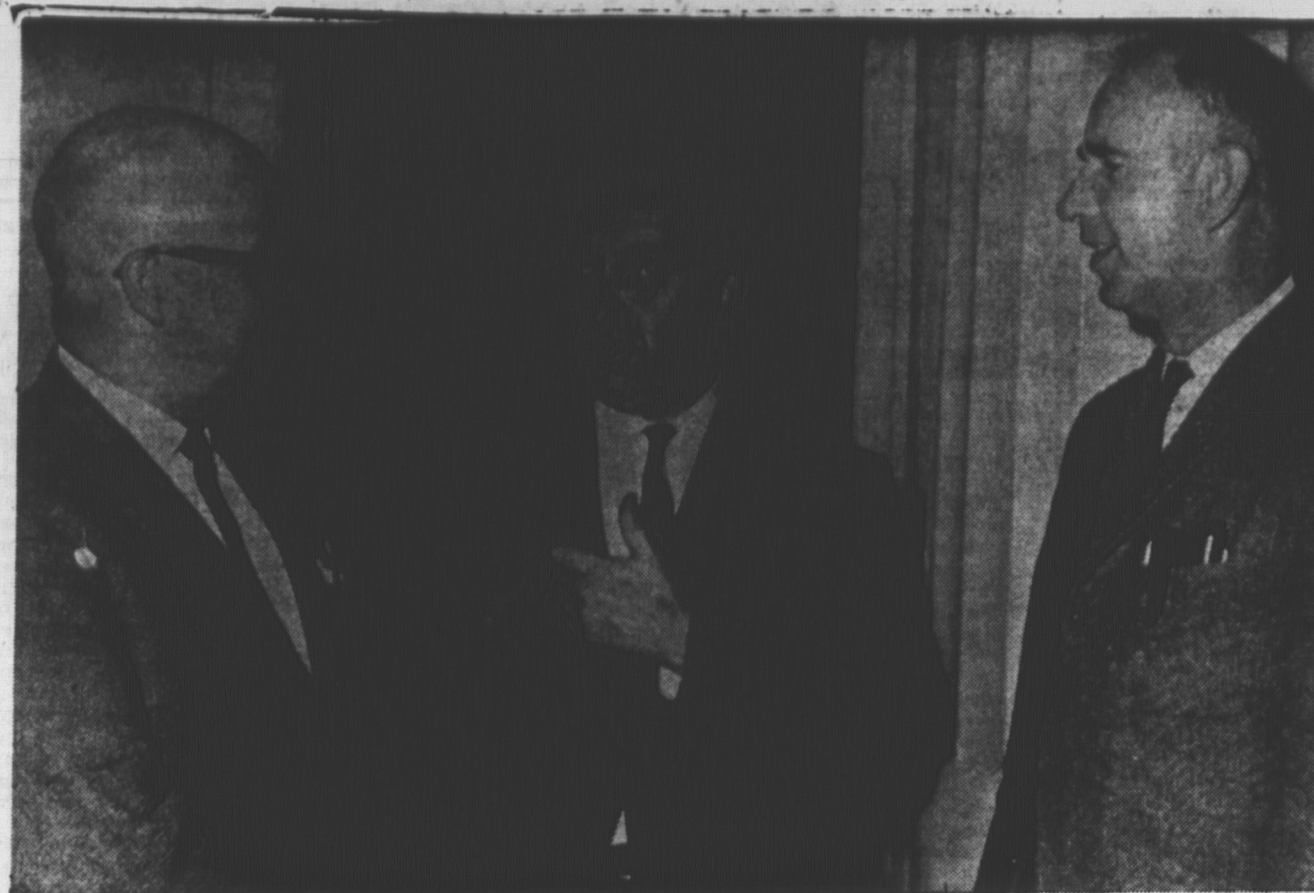
Snow And Wind Create Hazards

SUMMERSIDE — Yesterday's storm dumped two inches of snow on this area between 2.00 p.m. and 11 o'clock last night. The snow is expected to continue until approximately 7 o'clock this morning when it will change to snow flurries continuing throughout the day. Northerly winds gusting at times to 45 miles per hour created poor visibility in some areas and this along with slippery roads made for treacherous driving conditions. Winds are expected to remain at this velocity until this afternoon when they will change to a westerly direction and decrease to 20 mph. Three accidents were reported to the Borden RCMP Detachment yesterday. Yesterday afternoon a 1959 model car driven by Murchison Sellers of Charlottetown went off the road at North Tryon and struck a culvert, demolishing the vehicle. The driver was treated for facial injuries at Borden by Dr. Daniel L. Stewart of Bedouque and released. Complete details were not available on the other two accidents but a second one in which there was extensive damage saw a car go out of control at Searleton and strike a light pole yesterday afternoon. The third accident occurred at Middleton last evening. The driver of a vehicle believed to be involved in a hit and run accident here last evening was apprehended later in the

vicinity of Kensington. He is expected to appear on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident in Town Police Court this morning. The accident is reported to have occurred on First Street with a parked car owned by Wilfred Perry, operator of the Capitol Theatre, being struck. Damage to Mr. Perry's vehicle was estimated to be over \$100.

Seek Increase In Gov't Grants

A delegation representing the P.E.I. Federation of Mayors and Municipalities presented a resolution to the provincial cabinet yesterday calling on the government to increase its per capita grants in 1966 by \$4 to Charlottetown. Summerwide and all towns operating under the Town Act. The increase, if granted, would bring the per capita grant to \$16 annually. The resolution was presented by Mayor Bruce Yeo of Montserrat. Mayor Yeo suggested that towns and municipalities "are desperately in need of financial support as their own financial resources are limited." The resolution was drafted at the May meeting of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities.

Juvenile Remanded In Freetown Shooting

SUMMERSIDE — A Freetown, P.E.I. juvenile appeared before Juvenile Court Judge W.E. Darby here last evening on a charge arising from the shooting death of a Freetown resident, Sterling William Andrew, 73, Monday night. Judge Darby remanded the youth in proper juvenile custody pending determination of the

course to be taken in the matter. Mr. Andrews was found dead in his home at approximately 8.30 Monday night with a bullet wound in the head. RCMP here were notified along with Dr. Marvin Clark of Kensington who pronounced the retired farmer dead at the scene. Also called to the scene was Coroner Dr. C.A. Coady of Charlottetown who ordered an autopsy yesterday morning. The remains were transferred to Charlottetown by an ambulance from Davison's Funeral Home of Kensington and following the autopsy it was announced that an inquest has been ordered for Dec. 13 at 8.30 p.m. in Charlottetown City Hall.

Investigation was opened immediately upon receiving word by the local RCMP detachment under the supervision of the NCO in charge of the Detachment, Sgt. W.J.R. Macdonald, assisted by Cpl. H.V. Cameron. The juvenile was apprehended at approximately midnight Monday and taken into custody. The investigation is continuing.

SURVIVORS Survivors of the deceased along with his wife, the former Hilka Stevenson of Spring Valley, are five sons and three daughters: Harold, Graham's Road; Malcolm, Sherwood; William, Charlottetown; Alan, a student at the University of New Brunswick and Arthur, at home; Jean, Mrs. Arthur Bell, Gimli, Man.; Thelma, Mrs. Borden Campbell, Irishtown, and Mildred, Mrs. Byron MacLean, Churchill, Man.

Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Ed Stafford and Mrs. William Stafford Kensington and Mrs. Truman Paynter, Freetown, along with two brothers, James, Hunter River and John Norboro. One brother deceased him.

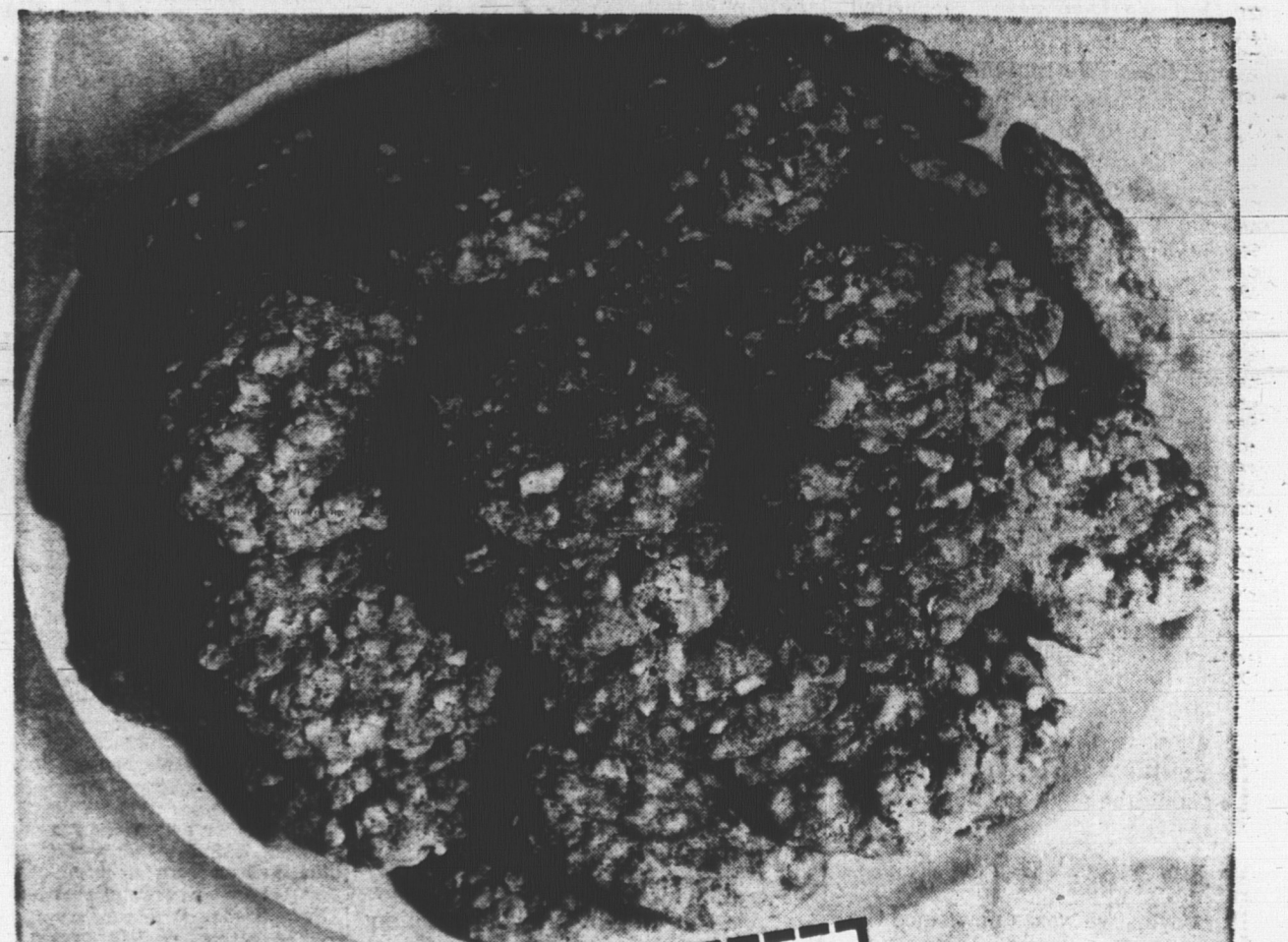

1 cup butter and margarine mixed
