Boy Found Not Guilty Of Murder

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Kevin O'Neill, 17, of St. John's, was found not guilty Thursday of capital murder by reason of insanity.

A 12-man jury deliberated for one hour and 25 minutes before bringing in the verdict, ending the four-day Supreme Court trial.

O'Neill was charged in connection with the death of Mrs. Edith Maude Parsons, 67, whose beaten body was found in her home here last Sept. 19. A confession given by O'Neill to police shortly after his arrest was permitted as evidence during the trial.

Two psychiatrists had testified that they observed the accused for 30 days and had come to the conclusion that he was mentally ill.

Mr. Justice James Higgins conducted the trial which heard 16 crown witnesses and two defence witnesses.

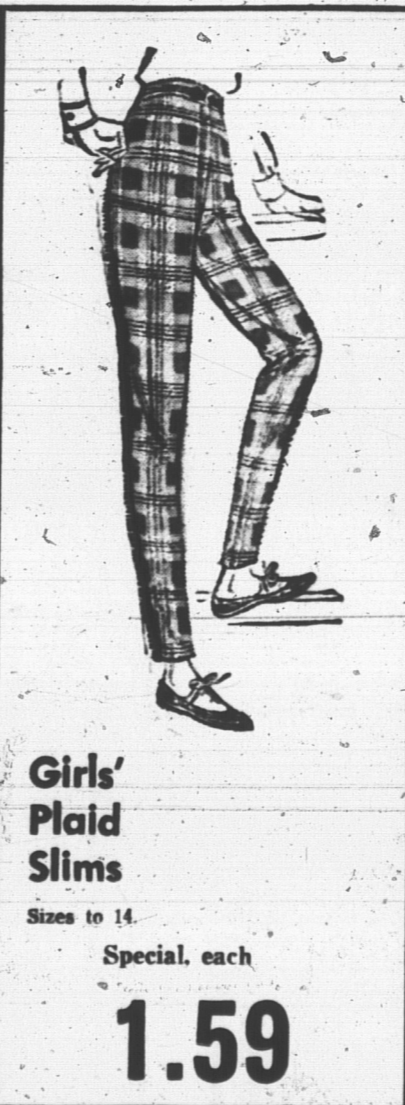

Fish Plant Purchase Is Seen As Good Move

The purchase by National Sea Products Limited of some Island fish packing plants was seen yesterday as a "good thing" by department of fisheries officials.

One official said "it is good to see national firms come into the picture as it will lift the level of the plants to national standards."

National Sea Products is one of the most progressive firms in Eastern Canada and fishermen are sure to benefit by the move. It is good to see some heavy brain power coming into the industry.

John S. Wright, Summerside, who is president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, said control by Maritime interests is good for the industry and is more advantageous to

local interests than when American interests were involved. Purchase of two Maritime fish packing firms announced yesterday in Halifax will give National Sea Products Limited controlling interest in two Prince Edward Island firms.

The company announced it had bought Maritime Packers of Pictou, N.S. and E. Paturel Limited Shelburne, N.B.

The Paturel firm owned controlling interest in Morell Packing Company Limited of Morell and Fortune Bay Canning Company Limited near Souris.

C. J. Morrow president of National Sea Products Limited, said there would be no personnel or operational changes in the recently acquired firms and his company would now be one of the world's largest producers of lobster.

Investigation Is Launched By SPCA Into Dog Killing

J. Stanford Biggar, president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, announced last night that a full scale investigation has been launched into the death of three dogs found a few yards off a road in East Wiltshire.

SPCA constable for Queens County Vernon Dennis said yesterday that the dogs appear to be beagles and were found with baler twine around their necks, lying frozen in a field. The dogs had bullet wounds in their backs and sides.

The SPCA received an anonymous telephone call reporting that five dogs were lying dead near a road. On investigation three of the dogs were found and local children reported two more bodies in the area, but they could not be found.

"This is a very cruel way of disposing of animals," said Mr. Dennis, "and anyone who wants to have an animal done away with should contact the SPCA or a veterinarian."

Mr. Biggar announced last evening that the SPCA is attempting to find the owners of the dogs in the hope that their identity could furnish a clue to the identity of the persons or

person who destroyed the dogs. The SPCA has one constable in Queens County and two in Prince. It is hoped that a constable will be appointed in Kings County in the near future. The Prince County inspectors are Jack Harkness and Ernest Biggar.
