

3 Stalled Nfld. Trains Freed From Deep Drifts

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Four CNR plows punched through snowdrifts up to 15 feet deep Monday to free three trainloads of passengers stuck in the Clarendville area of eastern Newfoundland by a New Year's storm.

Meanwhile, a search for three men missing since they started on a motor trip to Port aux Basques, 550 miles away, on New Year's Eve. Highway plows worked around the clock to free scores of cars stranded on roads in the Burin and Avalon Peninsulas.

Trans-Canada Air Lines had to cancel flights from St. John's for three days because of snow and poor runway conditions. Operations were interrupted again Monday by a new snow fall.

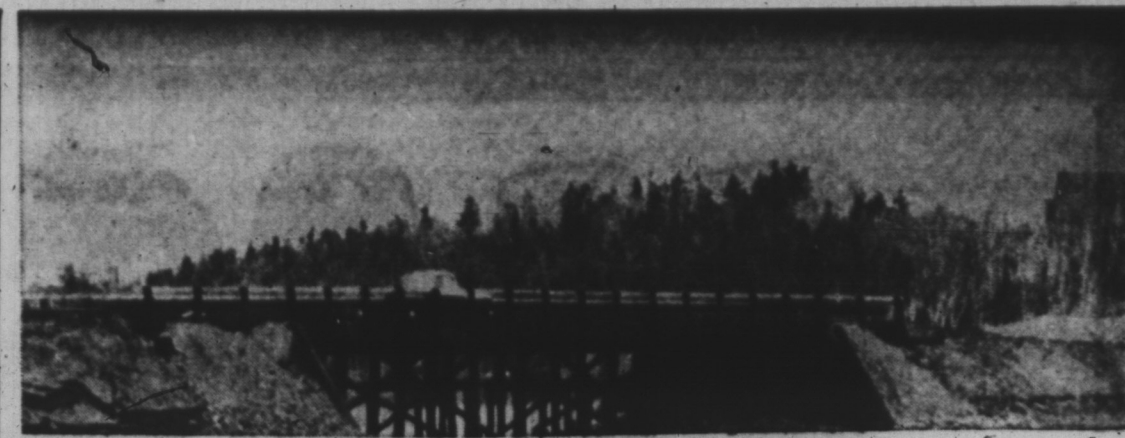
The new storm hampered CNR plows trying to clear away earlier snow. One official said the tracks filled in almost as fast as they were cleared. Two trains bound here from Port aux Basques on the west coast were freed at Clarendville and about 20 miles distance to Clarendville where food and other supplies for the more than 250 passengers were easier to obtain.

"It's hard job feeding them," a railroad spokesman said. The trains were carrying more than their usual quota of passengers due to poor road conditions and the Christmas-New Year's rush. The third train freed Monday was the CNR express that left here Jan. 2nd for Port aux Basques.

A light snow fall here Monday added to the backaches of residents who have shovelled away more than 22 inches since New Year's Eve. Traffic was almost at a standstill on New Year's Day.

The missing motorists were Greg Floor of nearby Goulds, George Keeping and Vincent Raymond of St. John's. RCMP said their car probably stalled along the road to Port aux Basques "in the vicinity of Grand Falls or Gadder."

During the weekend RCMP planes located three taxi drivers and their passengers stranded on the Burin Peninsula on the south coast. All appeared to be safe and well. Police said scores of cars had to be abandoned.



NEW BRIDGE NOW IN USE

A new bridge over the Kildare River at Montrose has recently been opened to traffic. Constructed by William Noye of

S'ide Man Is Convicted Of Coal Theft

SUMMERSIDE — A Summerside man drew a 10-day jail sentence when he was convicted in police court here Monday morning of theft of a quantity of coal valued at less than \$50 from R.T. Holman Ltd.

The accused had pleaded not guilty to the charge before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q. C. Saturday.

Evidence was given for the Crown by the arresting officer Constable Ralph Hardy. Constable Hardy told the court that the accused was picked up following a chase at Holman's Wharf early Saturday morning.

The witness said he caught up to the accused at Queen's

Wharf and when he asked what he (the accused) was doing was told "just trying to get a couple of bags of coal."

He said he returned to Holman's Wharf where Constables Berry and Champion had discovered two bags of coal on a sled near the Boat Club building.

In testifying in his own behalf, the accused said he lived with his aged father and they didn't have any coal. He along with another man whom he identified decided to get some. He also stated that he had never been in trouble before.

Suggests Power Of Prayer Not Realized By Christians

SUMMERSIDE — "A Call to Prayer" was the subject chosen for the opening service of the Week of Prayer services by the guest preacher, Rev. E. H. Bean, minister of the Kensington Presbyterian Church as he addressed a capacity congregation at the Summerside church of the Nazarene last evening.

During his sermon Mr. Bean said, "The Christian does not realize the power that he has at his disposal when he neglects prayer. The instinct for prayer is universal, there is no religion which does not include prayer in some form. Prayer is the mark of a Christian. Every Christian prays but not everyone who prays is a Christian. The scientist has atomic power at his disposal; the Christian has a much greater power at his disposal, the power of prayer."

The speaker called upon mothers and fathers to pray for their children, for husbands and

wives to pray for each other. He pointed out many biblical persons were noted for their prayers of intercession for others and for themselves, suggesting the names of Enoch, Abraham, and David.

\$503,885 Was Total Fire Loss In S'Side During 1958

SUMMERSIDE — Total property loss to fire in Summerside during the past year amounted to \$503,885, the bulk of this amount being the half-million dollar loss of the Brace, MacKay Company Limited store and warehouses, it was revealed at the annual meeting of the Summerside Fire Department held last evening in the civic building.

Forty-five alarms were responded to by the department in Summerside, and an additional five still alarms were rung in. The firemen also served surrounding communities at 12 different calls.
