

Eskies Have Playoff Spot; Alouettes End 7-7 Season

Despite a 29-16 loss to Calgary Stampede, Edmonton Eskimos have managed to squeeze into the third and final playoff spot in the Western Football Conference.

Saturday's game was the regular season finale for both Stampede and Eskimos. Both teams ended the season tied in points, but Edmonton won the playoff spot because of an eight-point advantage in games against the Stampede.

The first game of the season between the clubs ended 26-5 for Edmonton, a point difference that held them in good standing during Saturday's crucial game. Edmonton now meets Winnipeg Blue Bombers in Winnipeg Nov. 6 in a sudden-death semi-final game.

Touchdowns for Calgary were scored by Terry Evanshen, Howard Starks, Frank Bugd and quarterback Peter Liske. Edmonton's touchdowns were scored by Trent Walters and Jim Thomas.

In Hamilton, Toronto Argonauts ended their season on a bright note, but remained in last place. They defeated Hamilton Tiger-Cats 45 and finished the season with five wins and nine losses.

Hamilton also closed their Eastern Football Conference season with the loss-making their record nine wins and five losses. The only touchdown in the game came from Dave Theisen during the second quarter.

Ottawa Roughriders have already clinched first place. Hamilton plays Montreal in Hamilton next Sunday afternoon in a sudden-death EFC semi final.

MONTREAL (CP)—A single, scored on a wide field goal attempt in the fourth quarter by Peter Kempf, earned Montreal Alouettes a 1-0 shutout of Ottawa Rough Riders Sunday in the final regular-season Eastern Football Conference game here.

Romeo Hanover Has Triple Crown After Taking Stakes

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP)—Romeo Hanover easily won the \$169,885 Messenger Stakes and completed a sweep of pacing's Triple Crown at Roosevelt Raceway Saturday night.

Showing no signs that he had turned sour in the wake of such rumors earlier in the week, the three-year-old Dancer Hanover Colt went to the front at the start and led practically every step of the way for his 18th consecutive triumph and 31st victory in 35 career starts.

The time for the mile before 30,108 that braved 46 degree temperature and 30 mile an hour winds was a handsome 2:01.

FINISHED EASILY
Romeo drew out on the last turn into the stretch and finished 4 1/2 lengths ahead of Good Time Boy. Silent Byrd finished third and Goodnuff was fourth.

Romeo, a 1-4 favorite, paid \$2.60 in the win—only betting event, the world's richest harness race.

Romeo, driven by George Sholly, went the first quarter in 29 seconds. True Duane, a \$15,000 supplementary entry driven by Chris Boring, chal-

lenged him at the quarter pole on the outside.

Passing the stands the first time in a 58.3 half mile, True Duane actually held a head lead, but he couldn't pass Romeo on the turn and fell back out of contention on the backstretch as Romeo went on to the easy victory with a final quarter of 31.3.

"He's a great horse and he deserves all the credit," said Sholly afterwards.

Romeo earned a purse of \$84,942, increasing his all-time earnings to \$473,931.

True Duane finished fifth, followed by Overcall, Clay and Meadow Lenco.
