Petra Burka Has Chance To Become Skating Champ

CALGARY (CP) — Petra Burka of Toronto has an excellent chance to become the first Canadian since 1948 to become a world women's figure skating champion—but she doesn't like to be reminded of it.

Miss Burka, Canada's woman skater of the year in 1964, was at the peak of her form Saturday as she captured her second successive Canadian women's title. The victory placed her on Canadian teams selected to compete at world and North American title meets in the United States within the next month.

She is powerful, dramatic skater with a routine that includes 10 double jumps in four minutes, including the difficult double axel, in which she leaps a backward, turns twice in the air and lands backward.

Her mother, the former Ellen Denby, was Dutch women's figure skating champion in 1947. She coaches Petra at the Toronto Cricket, Skating and Curling Club.

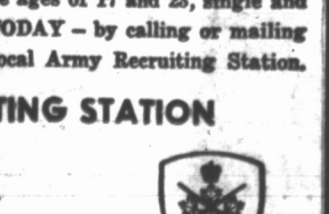
