Notes and Comments.

A queer community has lately been discovered in California. The Union, of Marietta, says: The census enumerator in charge of the work at Anaheim, in Orange County, has run up against a queer community, near that town.

The school elections recently held in the Dakotas indicate that the women of that place do not use the ballot to any great extent. In Sanborn County, South Dakota, out of 1200 female voters not over 100 voted, and that is the county where are the headquarters of the women-suffrage campaign.

Heligoland, which the British Government has just traded off for a territory equal in size to two-thirds of Canada, or the United States, is thus described by a recent visitor. It is a triangular island 5,580 feet long, by 1,845 feet broad at the broadest point, and 200 feet high.

The French people are highly incensed at the McKinley Tariff Bill and the French Government is discussing the question of meeting this hostile legislation on the part of the United States by reprisals.

In France the Anglo-German agreement has caused no slight feeling and is viewed with evident resentment. One journal points out that Heligoland just completes the plan of military canalization by which Germany can defend the Baltic and German ocean coasts at the same time.

The New York World publishes an interview with Minister Teui, Chinese Ambassador to Washington, who arrived from France recently. Minister Teui said: "Unless the United States Government repeals the law which now excludes my countrymen from this country, we shall treat Americans to a dose of their own medicine."

St. Paul, Minn., July 7.—The report reaches here that the town of Fargo, in North Dakota, has been completely swept away by a cyclone.

A railroad man who arrived from the vicinity this morning, says a terrific wind storm prevailed and several trains were blown from the track.
