ARTILLERY INSPECTION - Owing to the unfavorable weather yesterday, No. 2 Batteries Garrison Artillery of this city were inspected at the Drill Shed instead of at the Park. They received the inspecting officer, Lt. Col. Montizambert, the usual "general salute." The batteries were then brought to "close order," and No. 2 fell in rear of No. 1, when this order was put through the different manoeuvres by its officers. No. 2 was then brought to the front and put through the same drill. When this was successfully accomplished, four gun detachments were formed from each battery and in charge of No. 1, each were put through the gun drill at the close Col. Montizambert pronounced a few words to the men and expressed himself as highly pleased at the manner in which they went through the various exercises.

MARRIAGE - Concerning an event recently chronicled by THE EXAMINER the Colonialist of Victoria says: At the wedding of the bride's father, Mr. Henry Lawson, editor of the Colonist, Mr. John Lawson was last evening joined in marriage to Miss Marianne Lawson. The ceremony was very private, none but the members of the family circle being present. The bride, who is also of the Colonialist editorial staff, is one of the veteran journalists of Victoria, and numbers his friends, not by hundreds, but by the thousands, in all parts of the Dominion. SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

A Coroner's Secrecy.

LONDON, Oct. 6. An attempt has been made by the Coroner to hush up the facts in connection with the suicide of Lydia Miller or Manton, a chorus girl, who took her life by drinking carbolic acid recently. Lord Charles Montague, brother of the Duke of Manchester, testified to having been on intimate terms with the deceased. It is also alleged that Prince Albert Victor, the eldest son of the Prince of Wales, had intimate relations with the dead girl. The refusal of the coroner to give access to the depositions taken is said to be on account of the actress' noble and royal protectors. The St. James Gazette, Globe and other papers denounce the coroner's secrecy.

Stormy Weather at Bermuda.

BERMUDA, Oct. 6. A tremendous storm has raged here for the past two days. Incoming steamers report thrilling experiences. The steamer Alpha, from Halifax, is quarantined, owing to the nature of a disease from which some of her passengers are suffering, not having been reported. The Alpha was in collision with another vessel on the passage. There was no serious damage, however.

Herring Fishery a Failure.

HALIFAX, Oct. 6. The steamer Harlow, from Newfoundland, reports the herring fishery on the northern coast of Newfoundland and Labrador to be almost a complete failure.

Fire in Boston.

BOSTON, Oct. 6. The pork packing establishment of J. P. Squire & Co. has been partially destroyed by fire. The loss is \$150,000. Fifteen hundred live hogs were roasted.

Must Stand Trial.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. Prof. Briggs must stand trial for heresy. The Presbytery says so by a vote of 64 to 62.

Not Killed by Russians.

CALCUTTA, Oct. 6. The report that Captain Younghusband was killed by the Russians is untrue.
