TO BE NOTED.

Reckless Statement of a Grit Politician.

MR. EDITOR.—One of the most surprising statements that has ever been made under my notice is that contained in our Premier's political manifesto, in reference to the financial state of the Province. There are other incorrect statements in that document, but the one in which he makes a surplus in the revenue of the Province over the expenditure by means of borrowed money surpasses anything yet devised in the management of the finances of this or any other province or country.

What a pity our crafty modern statesman did not borrow a hundred thousand dollars, for then, by the same reasoning, he would have a surplus of more than eighty thousand dollars. Or going still further in his remarkable financial operations, if he had borrowed a million dollars, he would have a surplus of more than sufficient to pay off the debt of the Province, a debt contracted by himself and his Grit predecessors.

Has there ever lived in any country, civilized or savage, a man reputed to be sane, that ventured to publish such a statement? Recklessness and absolute disregard for truth must possess the man and the men who maintain and defend such a fraudulent statement. Our Premier should lose no time in obtaining a patent for his method of securing a surplus.

We can well imagine our inventor of the NEW SURPLUS PROCESS soliloquizing over the money he has borrowed: "Yes, I did borrow that twenty-five thousand dollars and many more thousands which I have spent. A few thousands of this borrowed money has not been spent. The small amount remaining of those borrowed thousands I will call a surplus and I can easily dupe our simple-minded farmers and others and persuade them that there is really a surplus. With the aid of these and those stiff Liberals who will vote to maintain a Liberal Government, no matter what its mismanagement is, I expect to ride to power again. Desperate cases require desperate means to succeed."

But there are too many men of honest purpose in P. E. Island who will not be misled by the deceitful figures or unscrupulous politicians and who will place them where they will not have the power any longer to ruin our Province.
