A directors' meeting of the P. E. I. Junior Farmers Federation was held in the Board Room, Charlottetown Department of Agriculture on Monday, July 11 at 8 o'clock with the president George C. MacDonald officiating. The following directors were present: Kathleen Delker, G. Jenkins, George MacDonald, Urban Laughlin, Sterling MacRae, John Chandler, George C. U. S. Potato Crop Estimated Higher

A large increase is indicated in United States potato production, according to estimates prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture. Forecast yield for all states is 400,335,000 bushels, an increase of 54,713,000 bushels over estimates made in July last year. Acreage this year is 1,444,000, up 63,000 acres from 1,381,000 last year. Yield is estimated this year on the basis of 27.3 bushels per acre, compared with a basis of 25 used for 1954.

A spokesman for the Potato Dealers Association commented that there is an unhappy outlook for Maritime growers unless some relief is made available by Ottawa to prevent dumping of this expected surplus on the Canadian market.

On the other hand, this is the July estimate and adverse weather conditions during the next few weeks could substantially reduce the yield in the late states. The highest average yield on record for all states is 253 bushels per acre.

The hope was expressed that prompt action would be taken by the Federal Government on receipt of the report of the Tariff Board which held hearings June 9 and 14, at which time the Provincial Government presented the viewpoint of the Island industry.

Search, Rescue Does Coast Guard Work

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence Minister Campney said Thursday RCAF Search and Rescue provides an excellent service on the west coast at much less cost than a full-fledged coast guard.

He was replying in the Commons to Thomas Barnett (CCF-COEX-Alberta) who suggested more use might be made of naval vessels for search and rescue or that a coast guard service be established.

Mr. Campney said cost of a coast guard would be "terrific."

He said RCAF Search and Rescue flew 2,720 hours last year and dealt with 230 cases—34 aircraft distress, 40 marine trouble, 119 mercy flights and the remainder miscellaneous calls.

Among The Farmers

WEATHER TALKS

We think the weather of the past ten days is worthy of comment inasmuch as the period has been our first and best heat wave of the past three years. As we recall last summer two or three hot days was about the story with the thermometer rarely going above 80. Early July usually does not produce our hottest weather—that is mostly reserved for August. This would indicate we may look forward to a real blistering in another month's time.

Ample moisture in May and June produced a bumper hay crop. July has produced perfect weather for haying and it is some years since hay of such a high quality has been saved. To date no crops have been actually suffering due to lack of moisture but the time has arrived when pastures and grain crops must soon have moisture to maximum yields are to be obtained. Should the dry weather continue dairy production will be the first to suffer as pastures will dry up and the after grass will fall to develop.

ANNAPOLIS DEVELOPMENTS

Traditionally the Annapolis Valley has been famed as the center of fruit production in Eastern Canada, however, the apple industry became a wartime casualty when the market in the Old Country dried up and the Canadian Consumer refused to accept fruit from the war-torn areas. The Valley farmer, in order to survive, remodelled the apple industry and in addition added to it a very substantial poultry and livestock development. The Valley poultry farmer does not talk in terms of one hundred hens but rather in thousands and indeed at one time a single operator had in production two hundred and eight thousand laying birds; and an investment of \$400,000 in buildings and equipment. A poultry effort of this size was an exception but there are, nevertheless, many farmers who have flocks ranging in size from 2,000 to 10,000 birds. To go along with this business, producers have provided themselves with strong and efficient marketing facilities. These facilities insure that eggs and poultry will be offered to the market in the most attractive manner possible. While a million apple trees were pulled out during wartime, the time is rapidly approaching when apple production will once again be back to pre-war levels and may even exceed these. Today the Valley fruit grower is equipped with four very large apple cold storages where the product may be kept for long periods in excellent condition. These storages are in addition to the many small warehouses which serve a useful purpose for short time storage but many of which have been converted for use in a variety of other projects. The Valley farmer has proven that he can develop other strings to his bow.
