RICH COPPER ORE.—On Friday Mr. D. Gunn returned from Halifax, where he has been taking out claims for a copper mine at Cape d'Or, Cumberland Co. Mr. Gunn has associated with him, Mr. C. S. Muir, of Parrsboro, and S. W. Kirkpatrick of Cape d'Or. This copper mine is said to be the richest yet discovered in the Province. A lead 25 feet wide is opened, while on the shore, are tons of small pieces of copper, pure as the metal can be in its natural state. The samples which Mr. Gunn had with him at Halifax were pronounced 150 per cent purer than the Canadian cent. The claims were for their property, cover five miles, and were secured to Mr. Gunn and his associates, only a few hours ahead of other parties from Parrsboro.—TRINITY NEWS.

**NEW PORK-PACKING HOUSE.**

Large Meeting in Summerside Yesterday.—Resolutions Passed.

The convention of farmers held in Market Hall, Summerside, yesterday afternoon was largely attended. The spacious hall was crowded to the doors, and about a hundred of those present could not obtain sitting room. Mr. William McNeill Simpson, of Hamilton, was called to the chair, and Mr. Thomas Moyses occupied the secretary's desk.

The chairman pointed out that the object of the meeting was to discuss the advisability of establishing a co-operative pork packing establishment in Summerside, and invited the delegates present to report. The reports of the delegates indicated a strong feeling in favor of the proposed undertaking.

After considerable talk favorable to the enterprise, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

That in the opinion of this meeting it is in the interest of the people, and especially of the farmers of this part of the province, to erect and operate a co-operative curing packing and shipping association at Summerside.

That it is expedient to carry out this object by a joint stock company in which all who desire to promote the welfare of this country are expected and solicited to subscribe stock.

That as soon as the amount of said subscription will warrant, an application should be made to the Lieut.-Governor in Council for letters patent incorporating the company.

That the proposed corporate name of the company shall be "The Curing, Packing and Shipping Association of P. E. Island (Ltd)."

That the amount of the capital stock of the company shall be \$100,000 divided into 10,000 shares of \$10.00 each.

That the affairs of the company shall be managed by a board of nine directors, and that the first provisional directors of the company shall be Peter Doyle, Lot 1; John McFarlane, Sea Cow Head; Daniel McKenzie, Lot 67; Walter Simpson, Bay View; D. H. McDonald, North Bedeque; H. R. Baker, Margate; Geo. Compton, St. Eleanors; Wm. Deighan, Cape Traverse; John H. Praught, Lot 16.

On motion of Mr. W. T. Lefurgey it was decided that when \$30,000 had been subscribed a meeting of stock holders be at once called to adopt such measures as may be deemed advisable.
