BOILED TO DEATH.—A few days ago the four year-old child of Gilbert Cormier of Cocagne, Kent County, met with a frightful death. Sitting on the floor of the kitchen the little one overturned on itself a pot of boiling lye, which had just been taken off the stove. The contents drenched the little one from head to foot. On removing the clothing the skin and flesh peeled off. Dr. Chandler was called but could do nothing for the sufferer. It died after two hours agony.—Moncton Times.

SIR,—For the benefit of "College Boy Fool" in yesterday's EXAMINER I may say: all of the materials specified for the new college are of the best kind. The construction will not be of flimsy nature and the brick walls are thick and ample for a building of that kind.

The floors over the class rooms with a span of 26 feet, are made of heavy joists 2 1/2 inches thick and 14 inches deep placed 12 inches apart and bridged with 2x3 stuff every 5 feet.

This is the method (when long timber can be had) followed in the floors of all modern school buildings and is the best as there are objections to pillars in the rooms.
