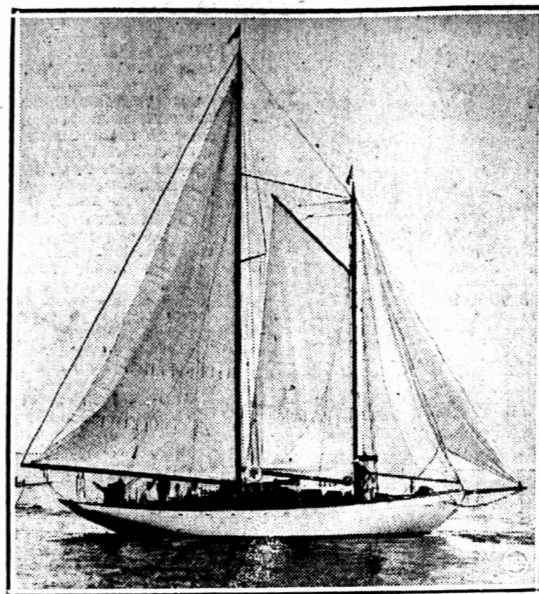


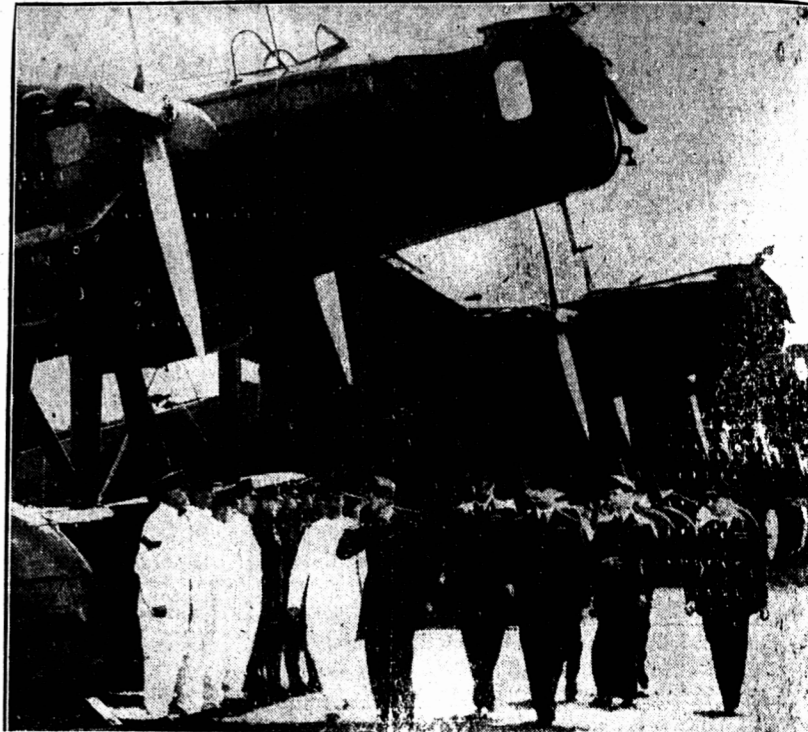

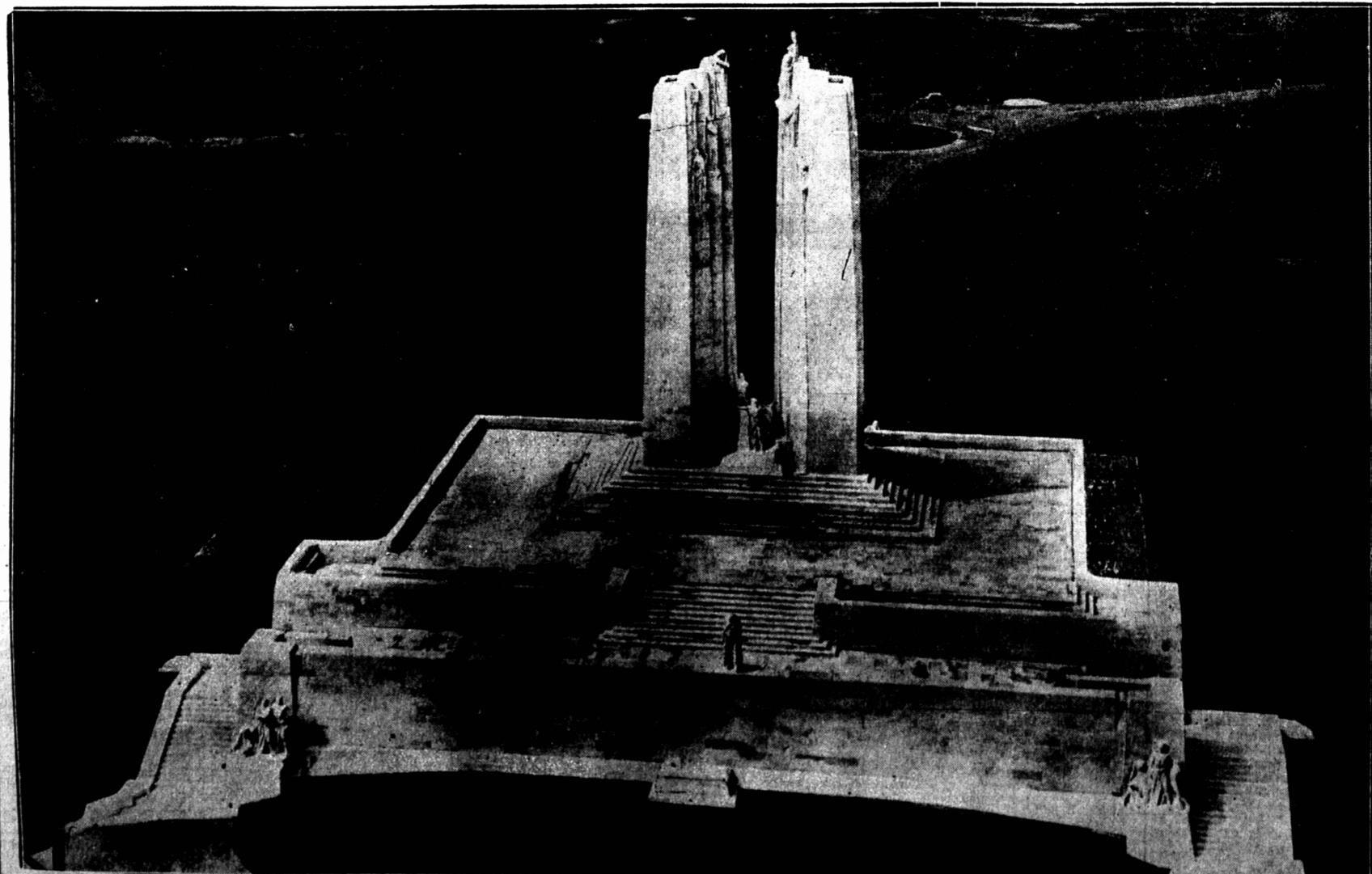

Pointing majestically and reverently toward the heavens, this magnificent memorial to the heroism of Canadians in the Great War was unveiled yesterday by King Edward. More than 6,000 Canadian veterans, pilgrims to the shrine at Vimy, witnessed the impressive sight as the draped flag dropped from the gleaming white pillars. The memorial is situated at the crest of Vimy Ridge, where the Canadian army won undying fame when, on Easter Monday morning, in 1917, after a barrage which for days had battered enemy trenches, they charged the heights, took them and held on.

Pope Welcomed to Summer Villa



From its three-story high balcony of Castle Gandolfo's beautiful, ornate Villa Barberini, Pope Pius XI solemnly conferred his benediction on villagers, gathered joyfully below to welcome the pontiff to his summer residence. Formally ceded to the Holy See by the Lateran treaty, this 17th century villa is the picturesque Alban Hills, 20 miles from the Vatican.
