PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—We are asked to announce that arrangements have been made for the giving of a short course in agriculture at the Prince of Wales College. The class will be started on the 3rd January and continue for three months. The object is to offer a special course to a class of young men on the farm who cannot get away for the whole winter but could be spared for a few months, when the farm work is not so pushing. The course may be briefly outlined as follows: (1) A study of the soil, manures, crops, etc.; (2) short courses in dairying, horticulture, stock breeding and feeding, breeds of live stock and chemistry. No tuition fee will be charged and no entrance examination is required. Students taking this course will have the privilege of attending classes in any other subject at the College when not engaged at their regular work.

MOUNT ALLISON UNIVERSITY.—The fiftieth anniversary of Mount Allison University, Sackville, N. B., was observed in this city yesterday by the preaching of special sermons in the two Methodist churches. In the forenoon Professor Andrews preached in the First church and Dr. Stewart in the Second church. In the evening a union service of both churches was held in the First church, at which sermons were given by Dr. Stewart and Professor Andrews. The former referred briefly to the fifty years history of Mount Allison, the good this institution had done and the graduates from it spread over all parts of the world. Professor Andrews spoke of the advantages the civilized world gains from University education. There was a large congregation.

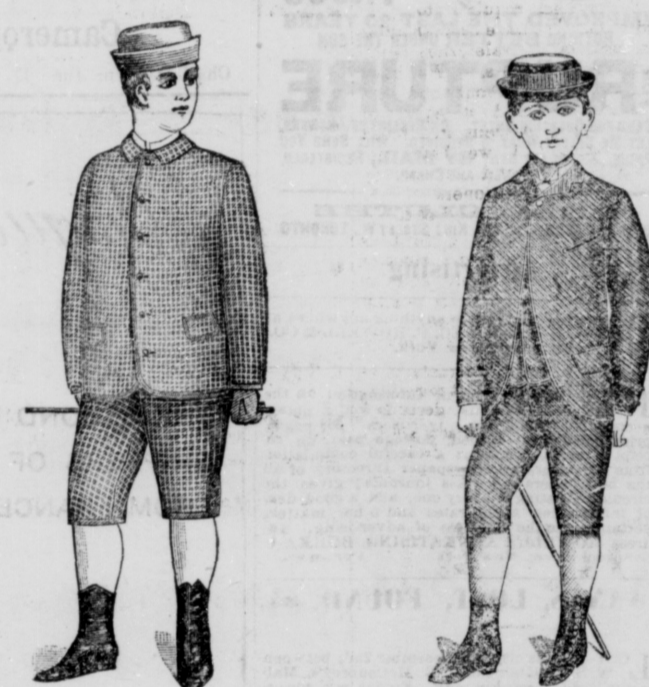
