Water Authority is Forecast to Deal with Measures for Control

The recently-appointed P.E.I. Water Authority is forecast to deal soon with measures for controlling the treatment and disposal of municipal sewage.

The Water Authority will have control of the use of all surface, ground, and shore waters, the allocation of the use of waters. It will also have control over the alteration of the natural features of any water course or lake and the natural movement of water therein. The Authority will also deal with the problem of pollution originating within the jurisdiction of the province.

The announcement of the appointment of the Water Authority was made by Hon. Keir Clark, minister of municipal affairs. The Authority has as its chairman Eugene Gorman, deputy minister of municipal affairs. Members of the Authority include R.D. Donnelly and J. Lincoln Dewar.

Mr. Donnelly is an engineer with the federal department of public works. Mr. Dewar has long been associated with agriculture and is secretary of the Federation of Agriculture.

Opposition parties attacked the proposal, saying the pension increase should go to everybody in view of the fast-rising cost of living.

The medical care plan has aroused even more controversy. Several provinces have attacked the federal criteria, while the New Democrats and dissident Liberals protested the delay of the plan's effective date to July 1, 1968.

The revision of the Railway Act, a by-product of the week-long railway strike hatched at emergency sittings in August, will be the subject of long committee hearings.

Commons standings are 131 Liberals, 86 Conservatives, 21 New Democrats, eight Credit-ists, five Social Credit MPs, three independents and one vacancy for a total of 265.

INEZ CHANGES

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Florida to just off Cuba's coast, Inez was only a shadow of the storm that killed possibly hundreds in the Caribbean.

The disaster co-ordinator for the Florida insurance department, Bruce Caswell, made a quick survey and said Inez was doing little damage to property in Florida.

Late in the afternoon, Inez veered more westerly.

The move reduced the danger to Cuba, which already has taken a 48-hour beating from the storm and had begun an emergency evacuation of the northern coast as Inez headed back for another shot.

But ahead of Inez lay the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico and a bountiful supply of warm moisture to keep her going and perhaps restore her old fury.

FOLLOWING BETSY

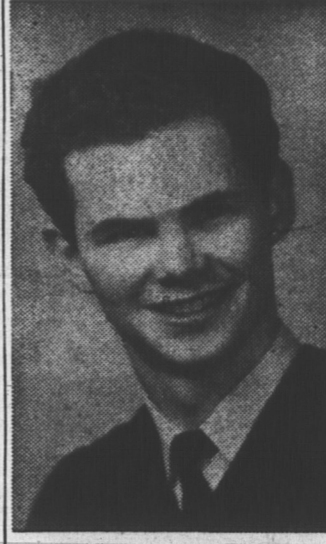
Inez was on a path taken by the most destructive hurricane on record, Betsy, which hit The Bahamas last September, then turned and barreled through the Florida Keys before regenerating over the gulf and battering New Orleans.

At least two ships were in trouble off Miami.

The coast guard sent its cutter Mackinac from Key West to the rescue of the Liberian freighter Verona, disabled 60 miles north of Nassau.

The 39 officers and men aboard the 628-foot Verona, bound for home port at Baton Rouge, La., were reported not in danger.

The 353-foot vessel Freighter Transporter with 31 aboard radioed that she was dead in the water 10 miles south of Miami. She had been en route from Guatemala to West Palm Beach. The coast guard cutters Walnut and Cape Fox left for the area.
