

Saints, Welshmen Play To 10-10 Draw In First Game Of Football Series

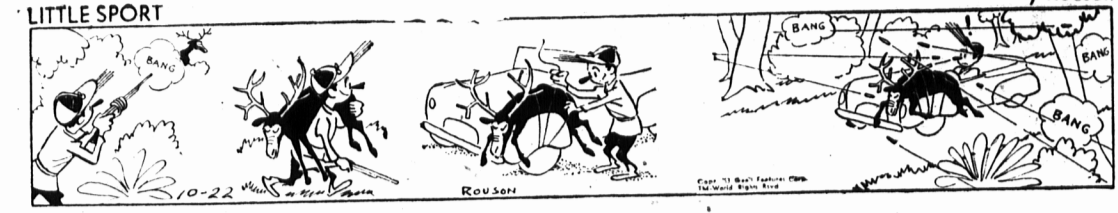

M. M. H. L. Levels Blast In Trophy Withdrawal

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—The Maritime Major Hockey League says the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association's action of taking back the Alexander Trophy appears to be a "deliberate attempt" to force the league to withdraw from CAHA competition.

C. Roy MacDonald, MMHL president, said Wednesday night that it "looked like the CAHA is trying to do the same thing to us as they did to the Quebec Senior Hockey League—make us get out."

The trophy, won last year by Halifax Atlantics and emblematic of the major, semi-professional hockey championship of Canada, was withdrawn because of lack of competitors.

There were four major leagues comprising 22 teams when the trophy was presented by Field Marshal Lord Alexander, then governor general, in 1950 but there's only the four-team MMHL today.

MacDonald has sent a telegram to CAHA president W. B. (Balby) George, asking for an immediate explanation of why the cup was withdrawn without the league being advised of the proposed action.

MacDonald said he asked George what trophy the league now is competing for, and if the MMHL will be permitted to play the winner of senior competition for the Allan Cup.

"The league isn't happy about the way the CAHA handled our affairs last year," he told the Canadian Press. "And this action doesn't help things this year."

"In 1950 the CAHA forced the Cape Breton League and the Big Four League into major classification. Now we're the only major series left and they've taken the cup away, given nothing in return, without any consideration."

At Kemptville, Ont., George said Wednesday that the question of withdrawing the Alexander Trophy from competition and its possible replacement still are under consideration by the CAHA executive.

The kid line of Dorrington, Carver and Hennessey gave a pretty fair account of themselves, and may measure up to the requirements of Major hockey. If they do, that will be a particularly bright feather in the playing coach's hat because the line is two-thirds spud, and also because it should reduce the overhead to have such a line take over from one of those expensive trios from farther west. It is perhaps not fair to judge the MacPherson-Towers-Richie line on its first performance. The boys just got into town, and were probably tired from the trip. In our opinion Towers, the chunky buld, showed up pretty well. Saindon looks good. All in all, the team would seem to need some capable reinforcements, and no doubt it will be strengthened in the course of a month or so. They certainly have a fine foundation to build on in that fellow Bessette. A real goalie, that boy!

Casey Stengel Is Named Manager Of The Year

NEW YORK, (AP)—Casey Stengel, only manager ever to pilot a team to five consecutive world championships, today was named manager of the year for the second straight time and fourth time in the last five years.

It was practically no contest as the 64-year-old skipper of the New York Yankees drew 107 of the 179 votes cast by members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America in the annual Associated Press poll.

Stengel first won the poll in 1952 and repeated in 1950 and 1951. He easily netted more votes than the combined total of the 15 other managers.

Splendid Job

Charlie Grimm, who did a splendid job steering the Milwaukee Braves into second place in the National League pennant race, was runner-up. Grimm received 30 votes, six more than Charlie Dressen, who placed third. Dressen was released by Brooklyn despite leading the Dodgers to two successive National League pennants.

Paul Richards, who directed Chicago White Sox into third place

in the American League was fourth. He was named on 10 ballots.

Lowell Hulse, who did a splendid job piloting a rookie-dominated Boston Red Sox team into the fourth place, received four votes. Single votes went to Al Lopez, Eddie Stanky and Rogers Hornsby.

Lopez landed the Cleveland Indians in second place for the third straight year. Stanky, in his second season as manager of St. Louis Cardinals, duplicated his third place finish of 1952. Hornsby, after leading Cincinnati Reds into sixth place, was released before the end of the season.

Stengel brought home a fifth straight pennant despite the absence of a single 20-game winner or regular batter who hit higher than .300.

Ordered To Defend Title By December 24

NEW YORK, (AP)—Boxing's Joint Board of Review Wednesday told light heavyweight champion Archie Moore to defend his crown by Dec. 24 against "somebody," but preferably Harold Johnson, the No. 1 contender from Philadelphia.

Moore successfully defended his title June 24 when he outpointed Joey Maxim, from whom he won the championship. His six months of non-title grace expire Dec. 24.

Charlie Johnson, Moore's manager, told the board that he has never received an offer for a Johnson-Moore fight. Moore won three out of four fights with Johnson before he won the title.

"We're willing to fight Johnson or anyone else if someone will guarantee us \$100,000," said Johnson.

Record-Holding Harness Horses Are Retired

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP)—Floric and Highland Ellen, world-record-holding harness horses, have been retired, it was announced Wednesday.

Floric, a six-year-old trotter owned by E. Roland Harriman's Arden Homestead Stable, Goshen, N.Y., set a world mark of 2:03 for 1 1/2 miles in winning the \$25,000 American trotting championship at Roosevelt Raceway last August 27.

Highland Ellen is a nine-year-old mare owned by Ralph Kroening of Milwaukee. She holds two records: Highest earnings among pacing mares—\$93,295—and best pacing mark for two heats divided, 8:04 2-5, set in Lexington, Ky., in 1950.

TORONTO, (CP)—A third-period goal by Eric Nesterenko gave Toronto Maple Leafs a 1-1 tie with the league-leading Detroit Red Wings in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The split moved Toronto onto a second-place tie with the idle Montreal Canadiens and gave Detroit a two-point margin over the two Canadian clubs.

Rookie Bill Dineen sent the Wings into a 1-0 lead early in the second period before Nesterenko capped the sustained Leaf drive for the equalizer.

Olson Wins Middleweight Title With 15-Round Decision Over Turpin

NEW YORK, (AP)—Carl (Bobo) Olson of San Francisco won a unanimous 15-round decision over England's Randy Turpin Wednesday night to win the world's middleweight championship. Olson, an 11-to-5 favorite, weighed 159 1/2 lbs.

The hustling American champion knocked Turpin down twice, for a five-count in the ninth round and a nine-count in the 10th round.

The votes, all for Olson, were: referee Al Berl, 9-4-2; judge Charles Shortell 11-4 and judge Arthur Susskind 8-7.

A capacity crowd of 18,869 paid \$167,751 for the nationally telecast and broadcast fight. New York was blacked out of the telecast.

Earl King, a Clay, West Va., high school player, died after being hurt in a game Friday night. Doctors said he died of a combination of shock and weak heart.

Lewis Robertson, a 17-year-old Alexander, Va., high school player, died after he left the field at halftime of a Saturday night game.

He complained of dizziness. Officials said he injured his head a week ago.
