Sydney Millionaires Edge Valleyfield 3-2 To Lead Series 2-1

SYDNEY, N. S., April 22 — (CP) — Sydney Millionaires edged Valleyfield Braves 3-2 last night and left for Montreal today with a one game lead in their best-of-seven semi-final hockey series for the Governor Alexander Cup.

Oddly enough, the two previous games ended by a 3-2 score. Valleyfield won the opener Wednesday and Millionaires retaliated next night to even the series. Fourth game will be played in Montreal Tuesday night.

Centre Don (Whip) Whalen scored the winning goal. Whalen's goal came with a minute and 58 seconds of regulation time left. Skating and stamina was the difference. The more veteran Braves stuck with Sydney through a killing pace in the first two periods. Midway in the second period Millionaires were ahead 2-0. Valleyfield fired a goal late in the second and an end-to-end rush by Andre Corriveau early in the third tied the score.

Millionaires opened up at the 13 minute mark when Bill Cupolo took a push-up pass and zipped it behind goalie Paul LeClerc.

Ron Matthews worked into the clear in the second session and drilled a 20-footer into Valleyfield's goals. Braves roared back on the next play with a quick line manoeuvre. Thirty-seven year-old Rosare "Kitou" Joanneau clearly beat Sydney's Nick Pidsodny on a back-hand shot.

Andre Corriveau tied the score at the 6:27 mark of the third. He started from his own back-boards, zipped down the ice, cut sharply at centre to the opposite side and rifled a short back-hand shot in the net.

Some 3,228 spectators saw the game.

Pidsodny and LeClerc each stopped 26 shots.

Hockey Cases At Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., April 22 — (CP) — John Horeck, winger with Charlottetown Islanders, Maritime hockey finalists, pleaded guilty in court yesterday to making an obscene gesture at a game here two weeks ago. He was fined \$15.

Islanders were eliminated by Sydney Millionaires in the fight for the Maritime hockey crown. Horeck, scheduled to leave Charlottetown today for his home at Windsor, Ont., did not appear at the hearing. His counsel was J. Louis Dubinsky of nearby Glace Bay.

Magistrate Vern Reid announced that information charging assault against Weston (Bucko) Trainor, another Charlottetown player, has been withdrawn. It was understood that the plaintiff, Frank MacCarthy, Sydney wholesaler will be compensated for a broken arm suffered during the same game that gave rise to the Horeck charge.

Welshmen Win Hoop Finals Opener From S.D.U.

Earl Nicholson's P. W. C. basketballers are today one up on the Saints of S. D. U. in the best-of-three games Island Hoop League final series as a result of their 61-45 lacing of the University squad at the Welsh court on Saturday night. The second game in the league finale will be played early next week.

The series opener, played before well over two hundred screaming fans, was a crowd pleaser from start to finish. In the opinion of the majority it was the game of the year. A race-horse pace, coupled with brilliant shooting and accurate passing, produced a brand of basketball that had the spectators on their feet time and again.

The final score by no means tells the whole story of the encounter. After going to an early lead and stretching it to an 18-5 advantage, the Welsh were hard pressed to hold off the furious attacks of the Red-and-Whites who fought back with gusto to reduce the thirteen point advantage to four markers at the half time whistle, the city collegians still on top 22-18.

The scoring rate improved in the second stanza with both teams giving full throttle to their championship drive. It was still anybody's game until the fifteen minute mark in the period, when the Welsh clinging tenaciously to their half time advantage and the Hillmen coming close on several occasions. Then, at the three-quarter mark the Tricolour team banged in four baskets without a reply and went in to a ball control freeze for the remaining time.

Hero of the day as far as the Welsh were concerned, was guard Garth Crockett. Crockett, besides playing standout defensive ball also helped the Wales offensive cause to the tune of 12 points, scored mainly on long one-hand push shots. Jack McAndrew was top point man for the winners with 14, while aggressive Jim Good and Charlie Hine had 11 and 10.

Jack Reardon was top man in a losing cause. Though marked closely by the Tricolour guards he dunked 7 beautiful efforts and added four free ones for an 18-point total. Fred Coyle ably seconded him with a 14-point effort and Joe Mullally added 7.

The P. W. C. squad were out-shot 69-57 but made 40 per cent of their field tries, the Saints sinking 29 per cent. The Welsh fouled 24 times and the Saints 23.

Come From Behind To Edge Canadiens 3-2 On Goal By Barliko

TORONTO, April 22 — (CP) — Slap-shot specialist Bill Barliko Saturday night broke up one of the most closely-fought finals in the 58-year history of hockey's Stanley Cup. He whacked in a goal after two minutes and 52 seconds of sudden-death overtime to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-2 victory in the game and a 4-1 conquest of Montreal Canadiens in the best-of-seven series.

The 24-year-old defenceman's decisive score sent 14,577 fans into a delirious frenzy. It climaxed a comeback drive by the Leafs who twice tied up the score—the second time with 32 seconds left of the regulation 60 minutes of play to send the game into extra time, just like the other four games in the series.

The uproar after the big goal centred on the ice. Leaf players on the bench swarmed over to hug the tall native of the Northern Ontario gold-mining town of Timmins. The Canadiens congratulated their conquerors and then made for their dressing room. Coach Joe Primeau dashed out to join in the celebration and his players hoisted him to their shoulders.

Sloan Hero Also

The big tying goal by right winger Ted Sloan — he scored the first as well-timed goal almost as much applause. It came in a dramatic power play with goalie Al Rollins benched for an extra forward.

Centre Ted Kennedy got the puck back to Max Bentley from the faceoff at the Montreal end. The little centre took a dippy-doodle course across the ice and then led drive. The puck got to Sloan, standing at the side of the goal and he flicked it in.

Left wing Harry Watson and right wing Howie Meeker set the stage for the winner. They got in together on goalie Gerry McNeill and the puck bounded out to Barliko whose 15-footer was dead on.

Hab Goals Outstanding

On the play, the Leafs rated their victory and only McNeill stopped them from rolling up a big margin. They ripped 41 shots at the cool little goalie—14 of them in the first period and 19 others in an amazingly wide-open third session when the Canadiens let go 10 of their total of 19 shots.

The Canadiens first went to the front at the 8:56 mark of the second period when Maurice (Rocket) Richard scored a typically brilliant goal. A pass from defenceman Bud MacPherson set him with only defenceman Jimmy Thomson between him and the Toronto goal. He beat Thomson, drew Rollins to the side of the net and then shifted around to slip the puck into the open half.

Sloan got that one back in a little over three minutes on an equally brilliant play. He stuck-handled his way down the ice after taking a pass from Kennedy, and got a blistering shot away with MacPherson practically riding on his back.

Leafs Take Out Goalie

seconds to play, taking Rollins from the goal. He went back on with 62 seconds left and 20 seconds later went off again, taking his place on the ice after Sloan's big one.

McNeill's brilliant goaltending won him the praise of the Toronto fans. They gave him a rousing ovation in the third period when he caught a blinding slap shot from Barliko with a maze of players near the goalmouth screening his vision. This and at least four other stops were almost unbelievable.

The Canadiens lost centre Bob Dawes in the first minute of the second period. He suffered a compound fracture of the right leg when he crashed into the boards in an attempt to check Kennedy, who side-stepped. Dawes started the game at centre between Meger and Paul Masnick.

As soon as the game ended, the Stanley Cup—polished and shining—was taken to centre ice. President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League presented the trophy to Kennedy, as Leaf captain.

The Toronto triumph completed a new hockey grand slam for Primeau, first hockey coach to win the Memorial, Allan and Stanley Cups. Twice he guided St. Michael's College to the Memorial Cup and the Canadian Junior title. Last season he led Toronto Marlboros to the Allan Cup and the Canadian senior title.
