

Candidates Working Quietly For April Vote

Candidates for the Progressive Conservative and Liberal parties in this province are working quietly at the polls for both of the speakers, lining up their organization, and laying plans for the all-important election day on April 8. Candidates for the New Democratic party will not be named until next Saturday, March 9.

Contrary to an understandable belief that nothing at all is being done, because no public meetings have been scheduled and only one TV speech has been made to date, candidates for both of the old-line parties are active. PC candidates Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean and Health Minister George MacQuarrie were working yesterday, for example in the French River area. Liberal candidate Ira Lewis said he and his colleague, Allison Gillis, have been working with committees for several weeks. Immigrants From Britain Begin Rush To Australia

LONDON (AP)—Tom Purcell, his wife and their seven small children will soon be packing their bags for a 12,000-mile sea trip and a place in the sun on the other side of the world. They are sailing to a new life in Australia at a cost to the family budget of just £20,000. Thousands of other Britons—including some of the country's best brains—are participating in what shapes as the biggest rush to get out of these islands since the booming days of emigration right after the Second World War.

For thousands like Purcell, a fresh start in a new country would be impossible but for subsidized passage. Purcell, 41, a London electrician, will pay only £10 for his own boat ticket and another £10 for his wife's. His children—all under 13—will travel free, with the rest of the cheque picked up by the Australian and British governments.

Life Term Given In Bride Slaying

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP)—A superior court judge of 10 men and two women Friday night sentenced Dr. Geza Dekaplay to life imprisonment for the acid torture murder of his bride. The only alternative for the jury had been to sentence Dekaplay to death in the gas chamber. Under California law Dekaplay will become eligible for parole in seven years. Dekaplay's murdered wife was a 25-year-old blonde. Hajna Dekaplay died in San Francisco after 32 days of struggle with the wounds—and the resultant infections—her doctor husband had inflicted on her.

Georges Marcotte Sentenced To Die

MONTREAL (CP)—Georges Marcotte, a tough ex-convict from Montreal's east end slums, after Saturday was convicted as the Santa Claus killer of two policemen during a bank hold-up and was sentenced to be hanged May 21. Marcotte, who turned 33 during the 12-day trial that began Feb. 18, has been charged with the murders of Constables Claude Marneau and Denis Brabant. He was tried on only one count—Marneau's slaying.

Maine Planning To Make Profit From Sun Eclipse

AUGUSTA, Me. (AP)—The State of Maine hopes to turn a handsome tourist profit from the eclipse of the sun July 20. Maine is one of two states Alaska to the other—where the eclipse will be total. And the economic development department is planning to take every possible advantage of that fact. The tiny part of the eclipse will run from Alaska through Canada to Maine. The department estimates 200,000 to 250,000 will crowd into the 45-mile-wide strip in central Maine where the moon's shadow will blot out the sun entirely.
