ANNIE PARKER IN A PECK OF TROUBLE.—A Halifax despatch of the 6th says: Annie Parker of McCarthy murder fame, was fined at the police court this morning \$8 or fifty days for being drunk and disorderly and profane; \$10 or fifty days for assaulting the police; and \$40 or ninety days for keeping a disorderly house. She has gone to Rockhead for the hundred and ninety days.

BARRENTINE "Ethel Blanche" Gould with cargo of 2564 Boxes lobsters, shipped by John Hughes 949 Boxes lobsters, shipped by Daniel Davies, 109 boxes soaps by Owen Connolly & Co., and 8109 pieces deals and ends containing 225,000 feet superficial measurement, 204 pieces Birch timber, containing 3311 cubic feet, and 50 cases Gin, shipped by Peake Bros & Co., cleared for London, G. B., on the 9th inst.

It is estimated that this year's crop of barley in Canada will amount to 10,000,000 bushels. The requirements for home consumption will be 1,500,000 bushels, and we will therefore have an export of about 8,500,000 bushels more than last year. Our export of wheat and wheat product last year amounted to about 4,000,000 bushels. Ontario consumes about 12,000,000 bushels annually, and the other provinces combined about the same quantity.—*Montreal Witness.*

REV. DR. LEEMING OF AUSTRALIA.—Amongst the arrivals on Saturday we notice the name of Rev. Dr. Leeming, of Australia. This gentleman is spoken of by the press of Upper and Lower Canada, as one of the most brilliant orators attached to the Catholic community. We understand that a few gentlemen of the city have already called upon Dr. Leeming to invite him to deliver a lecture, but we are as yet uncertain as to the result. If the Rev. speaker consents to the proposal it is probable that the lecture will take place towards the latter end of the week.

We announced some weeks since the appointment and promotion, by the President of the United States, "by and with the advice of the United States Senate," of Judge Mortimer M. Jackson, to the office of Consul-General at Halifax. Judge J., having been temporarily recognized as Consul-General, pending the receipt of his *equator* from Her Majesty's Government, has entered upon the duties of his office as Consul-General of the British Maritime Provinces, embracing Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.—*Halifax Herald.*

THE HOWGATE EXPEDITION.—The Howgate expedition steamer "Gulnare" left St. John's on Friday for Lady Franklin Bay, on a trial trip. Her engines work most satisfactorily. The new corps of engineers, selected from the staff of the Newfoundland sealing steamers, to supercede those who joined the "Gulnare" at Washington, has inspired confidence in all on board. The first port of call will be Disco, beyond which it is the opinion of old sealing and whaling captains that the "Gulnare" will be unable and unfitted to pass.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

At a meeting of the Irish members of Parliament to-day a motion was carried severely condemning the rejection of compensation for disturbance bill and declaring it as a duty of the Irish members to endeavor to induce the Government to abandon the rest of the estimates for the equipment of the Irish Constabulary as a military force with munitions of war.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

The Indian troopship *Euphrates* sails to-morrow with reinforcements.

SIBI, Aug. 6.

The troops are suffering from heat in Afghanistan.

CABUL, Aug. 5.

Stores for thirty days have been provided for General Roberts' expedition to Candahar. All of the troops are concentrated in Cabul. The Candahar force will be ready to march on Sunday; the rest of the British force in Cabul will march for India in a week.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

The majority of officers of 66th regiment were killed defending colors, which were lost.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

The *Times* says: "Both from England and India reinforcements are being energetically despatched, and six battalions of infantry and three batteries of artillery will be passing through Suez Canal. Without counting the recent addition to the total number of troops occupied by Afghan war, there are 60,000, of whom 40,000 are within frontiers of Afghanistan."

LONDON, Aug. 6.

Mr. Gladstone is convalescent.

In the Commons Howard has given notice he will introduce an amendment to Arnold's resolution, that it is inexpedient to alter the existing regulations relative to importation of cattle until the United States adopt means to prevent epizootic diseases.

PARIS, Aug. 6.

Philippe Henri Lemaire, a French sculptor, is dead.

ATHENS, Aug. 6.

England has notified Greece that she withdraws her former request to maintaining inactivity, in consequence of which notice an order for mobilizing a great army was issued.

VIENNA, Aug. 6.

Heavy rains in the last five days have caused terrible havoc in Silesia. Teplitz and Bohemia are completely submerged. The damage over a large tract of country is incalculable. A fearful panic prevails in the flooded districts, and a number of accidents have occurred.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

The British steamer *Rochester*, from Boston for this port, reported spoken 28th ult. disabled, passed Falmouth in tow; lost propeller.

The *Times* says the troops going to Ireland are 1,000 strong and are composed of three companies from Chatham, three from Portsmouth, and three from Plymouth.

BERLIN, Aug. 6.

Gladstone's illness and the passive attitude of the powers—created by their waiting for an answer to the Porte in regard to the Dupleigne—have brought about a political calm.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

Various specials indicate that the Porte will probably conform to the demands of the powers on the Montenegrin question and the threatened naval demonstration will not take place.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.

The steamship *City of Washington*, for Havana, on leaving yesterday collided with a canal boat, staying in her bow. As the steamer was leaking she returned to the dock to repair damage.

In Webster County, Ga., the wife of W. L. Gunnels gave her nine children merpiah and herself. Gunnels, on Wednesday, with one son, visited a sick neighbor, and returning found his wife and nine children apparently dead. Physicians were summoned, but Mrs. Gunnels and three children died; the other six were saved. She left a note saying she did the deed but gave no reason.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.

Executive Committee of Republican National Committee held another session this afternoon in Fifth Avenue Hotel, when another discussion was had in regard to sending aid to North Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia, but no conclusion was arrived at. Committee will meet again to-morrow.

The examination of Dr. Tanner at 3.30 showed pulse 92, respiration 73, weight 132 pounds, temperature 99. He was sitting in a rocking chair resting quietly.

About two thousand persons visited Tanner to-day. No notable change in his condition up to midnight.

SOMERSVILLE, Aug. 6.

Gen. William O. Butler, who was candidate for Vice-President on ticket with General Cass, died to-day, aged eighty years.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.

Garfield made a speech to the "boys in blue" to-night in response to a serenade.

Michael McGowan is under arrest for murdering his wife, who died last night from being beaten and thrown down stairs.

J. Connelly, a Coney Island hotel watchman, is dying from being horribly cut with razors by three negroes, who escaped.

James Kilroy was beaten, robbed and thrown into the canal in Jersey City early this morning, where his body was found. No arrests.

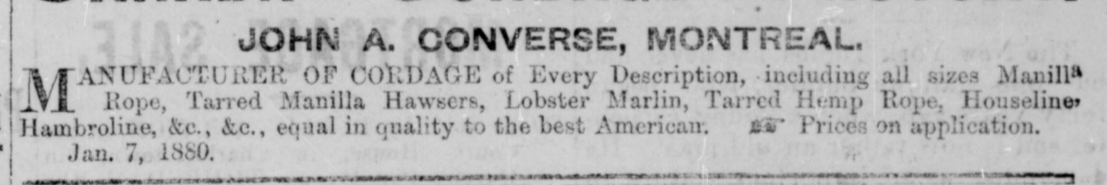
