The deceased although in failing health for more than a year and a half was able to be about and fully enjoy converse with neighbours and friends who called to visit him from time to time. Just two days prior to his passing the deceased suffered a severe paralytic stroke, his condition became more serious as the hours passed until 12.30 A. M. on the above mentioned date when he passed peacefully away.

The late Mr. Nicholson was born in Hartsville, Lot 30, more than 89 years ago, the son of the late Donald Nicholson, Elder, and his wife Catherine Gillis early Scottish pioneer settlers of this community. The deceased was the youngest member and the last surviving member of a large family of six sons and five daughters.

The late Mr. Nicholson as a young man left his native province and for some time worked on the building of the first railroad between Winnipeg and Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, and later for more than a score of years mined in the gold and silver fields of Colorado and Nevada, U. S. A. Returning to Prince Edward Island in the year 1896 he married Jamie MacLennan, daughter of the late Murdoch MacLennan and his wife Christie MacInnis of Hartsville, then settling on the old homestead where for a number of years he tilled the soil.
