### COOK'S CORNER

#### LIGHT FRUIT CAKE

1 1/2 cups butter  
1 1/2 cups white sugar  
Approx. 3/4 cups flour  
1/2 cup cream  
6 eggs  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 lb. white raisins  
1 package cherries  
1 package citron  
1/2 lb. walnuts.  
Cream butter, add sugar, drop 2 eggs at a time and add a part flour and cream. Continue with each 2 eggs, flavoring. Bake 3 hours in a slow oven.
