PURELY AN ACCIDENT.—Captain Smith, the commissioner appointed to enquire into the loss of the Dominion line steamship Montreal, reported that the stranding of the vessel during a dense fog was purely accidental, and that it is not necessary to deal with the certificate of the master.

HOW THE CASE WAS SETTLED.—Mrs. Julia Weller, of New York, began a breach of promise suit a few weeks ago against Frenott Schneider, a wealthy real estate owner, for \$10,000 damages. Last Wednesday Mr. Schneider called upon Mrs. Weller and talked the matter over with her. In half an hour everything was amicably settled, and they went to a justice living in West Hoboken and were married. Mrs. Weller is 34 and Schneider is 60.

NOTHING UNUSUAL THERE.—The Montreal Transcript says: The Charlottetown EXAMINER says that a wind-storm struck that city the other night and was unusually severe in the vicinity of the City Council Chamber, delaying the transaction of business upwards of two hours. This may be a novelty on the Island side of the Straits, but on the mainland side, wind-storms in the vicinity of Council Chambers are by no means rare.

DECLARED A DRAW.—In the Gaudaur-Teemer boat race, which came off on Friday last, the referee declared it a draw, and ordered the men to row again on Woods' Run course, in the Ohio river. Gaudaur's backer refused to agree to the terms, and the money was returned to the men. Teemer offered to increase the stakes to \$500, and row again at Woods' Run, or any course in New York. Gaudaur refused. The referee stated in his decision that Hamm violated the articles of agreement by pulling in Teemer's water, when he had no right to be on the course.

A PRACTICAL PROHIBITIONIST.—If report be true, Father Cordeau, the French parish priest, now officiating in the region about the Joggins, Cumberland County, has a practical way of dealing with the liquor question. Finding that habitual weakness was too prevalent in the neighborhood especially among the Acadian workmen, and that the houses where liquor was sold were, for the most part, kept by members of his flock, he took occasion to denounce the traffic from his pulpit. He commanded the liquor sellers to close up their business within a certain specified time. As a result of this peremptory order, it is said that liquor can be had in only one house, in the large and populous parish. This establishment is kept by a man of another faith.—St. John Sun.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Provincial Synod.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16. The Provincial synod on Saturday had a lengthy discussion on the objectionable methods of raising money for church purposes. It occurred on Judge MacDonald's resolution requesting the bishops and clergy to do what they may to bring those under their spiritual oversight to a realization of how dishonoring to Christ and his church is neglect of duty and contempt of privilege in the matter of Christian giving. After a lengthy discussion two amendments were voted down, and Judge MacDonald's motion carried by a large majority. At the afternoon session the report of the joint committee of Christian union was then taken up. The report, as noted, was discussed by the committee, and although no formal resolution had been adopted, there seemed to be good ground for the hope that a basis of agreement might be arrived at as to the first three points laid down in the resolutions of the Lambeth Conference—1st, the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as containing all things necessary to salvation, and as being the rule and guide of faith; (2) The Apostles' Creed as the baptismal symbol, and the Nicene Creed as a sufficient statement of Christian faith. (3) The two Sacraments ordained by Christ Himself: Baptism and the Lord's Supper, ministered with the unfeeling use of Christ's words of the institution and of the elements ordered by Him. After several speeches the report was concurred in. After discharging some routine business the Synod adjourned.

News from Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. Chief Justice Armour, of Ontario, and Chief Justice Ritchie, of the Dominion Supreme Court, express themselves in favor of a court of divorce for the Dominion. The Governor-General and suite arrived here this morning and leave to-morrow for the North-west and British Columbia, accompanied by Sir James Grant, His Excellency's physician, and Mr. Fred Villiers, war correspondent of the London Graphic. The charter of the North-west Central Railway has been sold to a syndicate of English capitalists, who agree to build 50 miles of road this year, and to complete the whole as soon as possible. The capital of the company is \$10,000,000. This is the railway that Beatty and Woodworth quarrelled over.

Surveying the Route.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16. Mr. John J. McDonald, vice-president of the Temiscouata railway, who is here, says his company have two parties out surveying the route between Edmundston and Moncton across New Brunswick, and that the Grand Trunk Co. are in full sympathy with the project to form an all-Canada route from Montreal to Halifax quite as short as the Short Line through Maine, and over which freight and passengers could be transported without any difficulty about bonding or international trade regulations.

The Treaty Broken.

LONDON, Sept. 16. At a meeting at Popular to-night, Burns said the treaty with the workmen had been broken by subordinate officers of the dock company. Some of the wharfingers also tried to get men at the old terms, but had failed. Unless the agreement with the men was kept, there would be another strike.

Steamer Detained.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16. The steamer Earl King has arrived in port. She was detained for some days in London, and the officers set to and loaded her themselves. They were obliged to protect themselves with revolvers as they worked.

Baseball.

St. John, Sept. 16. In the ball game to-day, between the St. Johns and the New York Auburns, the former won 17 to 4. Parsons pitched for the St. John and Oberlander and Clare for the visitors.

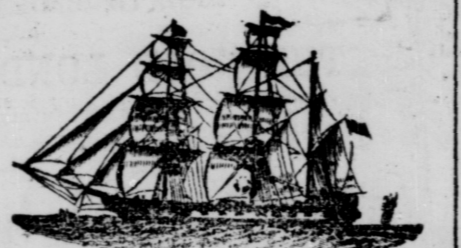
