BUT ANYTHING (Continued from Page 1) trademark of America political conventions. Delegates booted into the aisles, waving placards bearing almost every imaginable slogan. A band joined in. Balloons floated up. State after state grabbed its own banner and hopped into a procession that snaked through the hall. It took 43 minutes to let off the steam.

Then a competing clamor rose above the 1206 delegates. "We want Ike! We want Ike!" The forces of Eisenhower were building their strategy on an attempt to clinch the nomination on an early ballot before Taft's hard-baked backers could regroup effectively for a desperate drive to head them off.

The "favorite-son" candidates on whom Eisenhower counts for secondary support—Warren and Stassen—still were hoping for that deadlock that might let one of them get the call of the party for the 1952 political wars. So the whole outcome of the convention battle remained in doubt.

Eisenhower, nevertheless, was clearly out front at last. Two key test-vote victories on the convention floor gave the General the bulk of the disputed Georgia and Texas delegations in the early-morning hours. Late today Eisenhower had lined up nine more delegates, whereas Taft had picked up only one. The Associated Press tally of delegates stood like this: Eisenhower 523, Taft 487, Others 110. Uncommitted 86. Needed to nominate 604.

Platform Adopted While the presidential contestants struggled for the grand prize the convention adopted its 1952 platform without the fight leaders had feared. The platform accuses the Truman administration of fashioning a socialistic state at home and appeasing Communism abroad. It promises that the Republicans will lead free men to "a march into a new day."

Report Smallpox Epidemic In Tibet HARSIL, Indo-Tibetan Border, July 10 (AP)—A smallpox epidemic is sweeping through the ranks of Red China's 5,000 soldiers in Western Tibet, traders reaching this isolated Himalayan frontier village reported today. Tibetans bearing loads of wool and rock salt said many Chinese troops are dying as a result of smallpox.
