P. E. I. Has Bumper Lobster Catch



Prince Edward Island fishermen reaped a bumper harvest of lobsters this spring. J. J. Larrabee, supervisor of fisheries, reported they had brought in 7,351,300 pounds of lobsters with a market value of \$1,537,500. Many of this year's P. E. I. lobsters will probably be sent to markets alive in cans. This new process eliminates many of the hazards of ordinary packing. The lobsters are packed two to a can, alive in a special liquid. They are then air-mailed to consumer markets, arriving as fresh as when they first appeared from the ocean.
